## "IT HAPPENED"



Twenty-five years ago, Madison-Grant High School opened its doors for the first time. During the 1969-1970 school year, the world outside the school was experiencing a turbulent period of social change and upheaval. Students at Colombia University, Queens College, Berkely, and many other colleges across the U.S. organized protests and occupied buildings demanding an end to U.S. involvement in Vietnam. On November 15, 1969, 250,000 anti-war protesters marched on Washington D.C..

The 1969-1970 school year in many ways proved tragic. Charles Manson shocked the nation with his family murders of actress Sharon Tate and several others. To the dismay of many of the anti-war movement, Nixon ordered troops into Cambodia. Four student protesters were killed by

National Guardsmen at Kent State. A musical era ended with the break up of the Beatles.

On the positive side, the first men landed on the moon and youths expressed their opinions and emotions through music at the Woodstock Music and Arts Fair. Many of the teachers who lived through these events are still teaching at Madison-Grant today (including Mr. Miller at left).
"It happened at Woodstock,"stated Mike Martin. History seems to repeat itself. Now twenty-five years later, there has been another Woodstock, many of the fashions resemble those of the early '70's, and there are still those who like to send American troops into other countries.


## "I CHANGED MY EXPECTATIONS"

While Madison-Grant graduated its twenty-fifth senior class, many teachers were able to look back at the different types of students that have passed through the halls of MadisonGrant high school. These teachers have seen fads come and go, technology change their classrooms and students attitudes change from year to year.

Thirty-three years ago when Mr. Bach began teaching, the dress code was women had to wear dresses and male teachers had to wear suits and ties. Mr. Bach found the students were interested in such items as hula hoops and pet rocks. When Mr. Earnest, Mrs. Bragg, and Mrs. Melson arrived at Madison-Grant students were wearing bell-bottoms, mini skirts, and platform shoes. Modern technology has affected every teacher's classroom at Madison-Grant. The use of computers, laser discs, CD roms, television, VCR's, and calculators have changed the way subjects can be taught. problems. Mrs. Melson (at right in the early '70's) stated, "I've had to change my expectations if I want to keep any peace of mind."

Students have changed and so have the students' attitudes. Teachers expressed that students have become more irresponsible and disrespectful. Many teachers believed this was partially due to television programing and changes in the families. Students have also lost interest in school work and do not study as much. "Students study less because more activities are competing for their time," commented Mrs. Herring. Mrs. Bragg also commented that students don't seem as happy and carefree as they used to be. Many teachers wished that they could have more contact with the parents and felt that part of the reasons the students have changed is because parents are busier now than they used to be.

Many teachers at MadisonGrant have been able to watch the changes of generations and technology firsthand and have adapted their lives accordingly.
