


Excitement












Here's the Scoop










Sabrina Mossmann visited from



Richard Merritt Retires



After 38 years as an educator in the Elwood school system, Mr. Richard Merritt is retiring. Mr. Merritt has served as a sixth grade school teacher, a seventh and eighth grade science teacher, the Elwood Junior High School principal for 13 years, and the Elwood Community High School principal for one year. However, during the last 15 years he has served as the superintendent of the Elwood School Corporation. Mr. Merritt graduated from Elwood Community High School in 1952. He later graduated from Ball State University with a bachelors degree in science, and in 1963 he received his masters degree in science.

When asked what he felt were his most successful accomplishments, Mr. Merritt informed us that there were several. He listed opening new buildings, especially on the secondary level; keeping class size down; developing new programs to discourage the use of drugs and tobacco, improving attendance; and offering the school as a community center by allowing it to be open to the public. However, Mr. Merritt stressed, "I expected no thanks;



I only wish I could have done more." Looking back, Mr. Merritt agreed that one of his most memorable moments and biggest accomplishments with his work here was being appointed superintendent.

Overall, Mr. Merritt said that he would miss being so involved. He stated, "I knew what was going on and what was needed. It also helped that my wife was a teacher because she is active with the kids and would let me know what was going on. I guess I'll just have to learn to get involved as a community member rather than a leader."

After retirement Mr. Merritt plans to work around his home and maybe do a little traveling. He does say, how-

ever, that he will stay involved with the school because he wants our school system "to be the best system whether or not he is superintendent." Mr. Merritt stated that he will miss work and everyone here but will continue to assist in developing a better future for young adults.

When asked what advice he would give to students, Mr. Merritt stated, "The world is extremely competitive. It is possible to win the lottery, but most won't. Education is the only sure way to climb the ladder of society and allow you to reach your goals." Mr. Merritt stressed that "you not only need skill, but personality. Do something that will allow you to be your own self."

McQuitty Retires

After 12 years of working as athletic director, Mr. Darrell McQuitty retired from Elwood Community School Corporation. Mr. McQuitty graduated from Wendell L. Wilkie High School in 1958. In 1962 he graduated from Purdue University with a bachelor's degree in health and physical education. Later, in 1967 he earned his master's degree from Ball State University. Before coming to work in the Elwood School Corporation, Mr. McOuitty taught physical education, biology, and driver's education at Charlestown High School. He was the varsity boys' coach for seven years, the assistant football coach, the varsity girls' basketball coach, and the tennis team coach. For the past twelve years he has been the athletic director for Elwood Community High School. As athletic director Mr. McQuitty was in charge of the entire athletic department. Scheduling games, hiring officials, keeping records of athletic awards and financial books were all a part of his job.

After retirement Mr. McQuitty plans to work. He would like to find his "second career." He states, "I want to try something different because you only live once." Mr. McQuitty is going to miss his involvement with young people and his connections with other schools. Although he is going to miss the people he works with, he is looking forward to spending more time with his family. Mr. McQuitty states, "I've had a lot of support from my wife and family with jobs that have taken a lot of time away from home."













According to Jerrico Planalp, "Running cross country has been an enjoyable high school experience. It was not just running but learning about life as well."











The Elwood wrestling team achieved many goals in their 1994-95 season. They broke more than one record this year and had more wins than any team, in any sport, in Elwood's history with a record of 25 wins and only 1 loss. They also won the Central Indiana Conference wrestling tournament for the seventh consecutive year, breaking the old record of six which they shared with Tipton. The grapplers won the Madison County tournament for the second straight year and won their sectional, de-throning the Frankton Eagles as sectional champions. By winning the C.I.C., the Madison County tournament, and the sectional, the Panthers became triplecrown winners for the third time. Elwood also won every dual meet in which they competed. 














Trying to gain possession of the ball, Tarrik Wilson and Mike Cogill trap their opponent.




















don over the Christmas break to participate in the Lord of Westminster's New Year's Day parade.









Coach Tod Windlan stated, "I was satisfied with the overall performance of this team. I was also satisfied with the dual individuals. The weakness of our season was due to


the inconsistent play from match to match. We could be very good if the boys will work and play over the summer."
