## Making

the Grade

Eighteen juniors and two foreign exchange students were "tapped" on February 24,1995, into the National Honor Society. In order to be a part of this organization, a junior or senior must have a minimum of a 3.5 G.P.A., be active in community involvement, and present time and effort in extracurricular activities. A committee composed of eleven teachers selected the students who would best represent the organization.
