## Curriculum continues to change

Numerous classes have been dropped throughout the past decade. ## Safe driving skills taught to students

## Local merchants make a difference

Fairmount, Summitville, Fowlerton, and Point Isabel are just a few of the communities that help support Madi-son-Grant High School.

Because the Madison-Grant corporation is composed of various different businesses in several towns, the businesses support various school projects.

Although inflation is affecting everyone, the local merchants are buying more advertisements for several items such as seat cushions, sports programs, and yearbooks.

In M-G's first yearbook, 60 advertisements appeared, compared to 116 advertisements in last year's yearbook. This comparison shows the increased enthusiasm from the community to support
the yearbook. We receive advertisements from businesses as far away as Anderson.

The yearbook staff appreciates this increased support, because the cost of producing the yearbook has drastically increased in the past ten years. In 1973 the cost was approximately $\$ 6000$ compared to $\$ 9000$ in 1979. The advertisers pay about one half the costs.
The staff has tried to keep costs as low as possible to advertisers, as well as subscribers. Advertising rates were raised this year for only the second time in 10 years, and even then they were raised only an average of $\$ 5$ for each size. Subscription rates have been raised only \$23 in the past 10 years.
