"Americans wear their shoes in the house and Japanese leave their shoes at the door," states Osamu Saito, From Chofu Tokyo Ja pan. In Japan you must be 18 years old to drive and you drive on the left side of the road. Japanese people use public transportation much more than we do in America. Osamu rides his bike to a train station, rides a train for 50 minutes, and then walks 15 minutes to school.

School starts at Myojo High School with homeroom at 8:30 am, and ends at 3:15 pm with homeroom. Then students sweep, dust and clean the classroom for 10 minutes. Most students attend a sport, music or art club for about 90 minutes before going home. There are few extra curricular activities, but here he participates in Drama Club, Science Club, Band and Choir. In his spare time, Osamu likes to eat, listen to rock music, plays guitar and reads novels.

Every Saturday night Japan, Osanu watches a television show called Best Hits U.S.A. which features videos.

Osamu's Japanese family includes his father, mother, grandfather, grandmother, and brothers Koji and Tomoyuki. David and Kathy Jones and Chris and Susan are Osamu's American family. In Japan, his family owns a restaurant and gets home late so they do not get to eat dinner together. Osamu's

American family is almost always able to eat together. Both families like to shop, go out to eat or to a movie on Sundays or holidays.

Ulrich Pohlmann (Ulli) from Norderstedt, Germany finds American eating habits very amusing. However, he likes our hamburgers and cheeseburgers very much! Ulrich says in Germany dinner is usually at 8:00 p.m. He feels that here almost everyone would die without eating before then!

Ulrich finds that in America school fills the longest part of the day. The length of a school day in Germany is from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., with the only afternoon classes from 3:00 p.m. to $5: 30$ p.m. on Wednesday. German students have no choice of classes. They do not have subjects that are taken every day of the week. Instead there are 12 to 13 different classes weekly with a different schedule daily. They do not eat lunch at school. The average test can last from one to four hours. In Germany, the students receive one report card after each semester. Ulrich has six years of English to his credit.

As a member of the band, Ulrich has put in a lot of practice time. He likes to play his clarinet, enjoys playing chass, watching TV and spending time with friends.

Teenagers in Germany listen to the same groups as we do in the United States, and jeans, T-shirts and tennis shoes are wore

there, too.
Ulrich's German family consists of his father, mother and fourteen year old brother. Steve and Wanda Cook are his American host family, and they have made his stay here very happy.

Markus Nauer describes his American Family as "Totally Awsome." He is very impressed with the togetherness of family life in America. He thinks it is significant that the whole family is at the table for dinner and spends Sunday together. "At home this is different" he states. Home, for Markus, is in Lucerne, Switzerland, along with 65,000 other people. Lucerne, in his opinion, is the nicest town in the world. His family there consists of his mom, dad, and twenty year old sister, and last not least, his cat. Hes Elwood host family is Jim, Beth and Marjorie Cole.

There are some differences in school schedules. School in Lucerne starts at differ ent times in the mornings, and normally ends around 5 p.m.. Students have two hours or more for lunch, and Markus goes home every noon. There are no extra curricular activities after school where Markus is from. Here Markus participates in cross country, band, and the Crescent staff for 1984-85 year. At home Markus plays in a rock band. Their music is called dialect-rock which is only popular in Switzerland. Markus has fit in well with life here at ECHS.

Several changes were made in Elwood Community High School curriculum this past year because of some changes in state educational requirements. A seven period day was initiated with a full 360 minutes of instructional time per day. The phase elective English program was dropped and the SRP (Student Referal Program) was started. Electives added include Czars and Commisars (Asian Study).
New teachers this year are James Pearson, Lorrie Sweet, Jane Scharff, Rhonda Winger, Mary Zehringer, Christopher Donavon, Annette Briscoe, and Helen Wittkamper.

The Administration sees no major changes for next year; however, some consideration is being given to continuing the smoking area and to improve the attitude and work ethic of students who continually fail.

School board meets monthly on the second Thursday of the month with extra called meetings as needed. They authorize payment of all claims and payroll, oversee short and long term maintenance, repair of all school property, plan for new buildings and other facilities which the school system may need, and authorize all personal changes.

Richard Merritt, Superintendent at Elwood, holds very important duties. Superintendent appoints members, like the treasurer. If anyone desires to address the Board, they should make arrangements with Mr. Merritt ahead of time to be placed on the agenda. Mr. Dudley is in charge of the bus routes at EHS. He does reports for reinversement and handles various administration problems. He also is in charge of the elementary school programs.
