






We Walked On The WI Side When We...









"This is the eighth prom I've worked with, and it was one of the most beautiful. The committee worked very hard to make this a successful prom," quoted **Mrs. Austin**.







College Classes for College Credit

College classes for high school and college credits are offered at E. C.H.S. The ACP calculus class is taught by **Mr. Donald Garner**; L-202, **Ms. Joan Mercer**; and W-131, **Mrs. Darren Paquin**.

The ACP calculus class is taught as a college level course. The content covered in this class is the same as at Indiana University. **Mr. Garner** said, "I enjoy the material and the increased challenges to the students. "The enrollment has been in a range from 15-20 students.

Literature 202 is designed to teach students the skills necessary to read literary texts carefully and to apply interpretation skills to that reading. Students learn to analyze and to interpret. It prepares them for college with organizational skills and time management. Critical thinking is vital. Students read poetry, drama, and short and long fiction.

Writing 131 is designed to prepare the students for college level writing assignments across the curriculum using critical thinking skills and emphasizing marking, highlighting, and annotating articles; summarizing an author's main points; synthesizing information from several sources; and supporting a thesis in 3-5 page papers using several sources and MLA documentation. Specific papers include summary, synthesis, evaluation, support of a position, and cause and effect. "I love teaching this class because students are really challenged to think critically," commented Mrs. Darren Paquin.






Christopher Swinefurth studies in the library for his first semester W-131 notecard assignment.









Project XL Competition


Project XL is a competition that rewards students for their academic and creative excellence. It gives students the chance to display their talents in six categories: writing, video art, poster design, original music, fine art, and performance which includes speech, skit, dance, drama, stand-up comedy, magic, and pantomime.

For a student to advance to the state competition, one must experience a four step process. Level one is the step in which individual schools choose the entries that will represent the school at level two. The students who win at level two move on to the third level. At regionals they choose ten entries in each category for the state finals, level four.


There was a total of 2,776 entries at level one. There were sixty finalists at

the state competition. Out of the sixty finalists ten percent of the entries were Elwood High School students. Elwood has had great success in Project XL by advancing at least three entries to the state finals in speech each of the last three years.

This year the six finalists were Kaori Nogimura (Fine Art), Cara Linsmeyer, Jennifer White, Robbie Leavitt (Performance), and a group consisting of Jeremy Hood, Guy Wolfe, Matt Baer, and Mike Retherford (Music). Also in music was Jason Blackford, the state champion in the music category, was awarded a one-thousand dollar scholarship for his keyboard competition, "Hold My Hand." Project XL is an opportunity for students to display their talents and receive well deserved recognition.



The year was very full for Latin and Spanish club members. Many students are given the opportunity to enjoy many activities.




























sectional, all ended in a loss.






Record Breaking Season



Explosive Panthers Have Winning Year




"We are very proud of these young men as they represented our school and community with class and sportsmanship,"commented **Coach Tony Boley.**
















As a young team they suffered from the inexperience of the younger players. The team ended its season with a 16-19 record. The most outstanding event as a team was shooting a 153






