In this day and age science and mathematics are fast becoming the basis for learning in the New Era. In keeping with the pace of the country these classes prepare Wilkie Highers for their entrance into this modern, highly complex world as mature, well-educated adults.

In biology, students experience the fun of tramping through vast fields, the precision exactness of dissecting an earthworm, and the rigid formality of making their herberia. To expand their knowledge in this "science of living organisms," students may meet the challenges of advanced biology. In such courses as chemistry, physics, and physical science the workings of our everyday world are learned through experiments with acids, bases, salts, heat, and light.
