






In the Memory of Marlene . . .



I hope that your education has given you these three things: a philosophy; an attitude; and a method of approaching, attacking, and solving problems. Your destinies as men and women in a free society depend first upon your belief in a supreme being; secondly upon an attitude of serving your fellow man; and thirdly upon the techniques, the knowledge, and the wisdom of solving these problems.

Will you be concerned only with the fulfillment of material needs; the making of appropriate responses and adjustments and no troubles; or will you be concerned and aspire to moral excellence and contribute be concerned and aspire to moral excellence and contribute to the inquiry, comment, and judgment by which justice may be clarified, equality established, and liberty enlarged among men.

The decision is yours. You are made in the image of what yours. The decision is yours. You are made in the image of what you desire. Seeing is behaving. Set your goals, your ideals high and then proceed to fulfill those ends. This will be your happiness.



hop, bakesale, and concession stand the last semester. On
May 17, some of the juniors decorated the tabernacle for
the graduating Seniors.

For our senior year officers were Dick Smith, president; Ronnie Haisley, vice-president; Vivian Craven, secretary; Nancy Roth, treasurer; Ronnie Wallace, student council president; Marilyn Holder and Jerry Rhoads, student council; Roslyn Carter and Ted Reasoner, social chairmen. Our sponsors were Mr. Fred Wood, Mr. Hugh Caughell, and Miss Marlene Earnest. After the death of Miss Earnest, Mrs. Florence Wood became our third sponsor.

We had our pictures taken by Mr. Adams of Kokomo during the summer months of 1959.


We decided to wear white caps and gowns for graduation. We Seniors enjoyed a Senior Vesper Service December 14 at the Friends Church.
