A SMALL TOWN — Elwood was founded in 1889, and this rural community has 10,000 residents. Elwood is also known as the Heart of Hoosierland.


A CLASS 3A SCHOOL — The school enrollment which includes grades 9-12 has 361 male and 286 female students.


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


This banner shows the pride Panther fans felt as Elwood played for the semi-state football crown, the first ever in the school's history.




Two new art rooms have been added to the high school. These rooms are equipped with kilns, and each teacher will have her own office.



a row. About 450 students attended the game. Brad Griffith was crowned 1987 Homecoming king.









# Featuring the actual delegates, EHS's own Constitutional Convention

September 17, 1987, was the date of the anniversary of the adoption of the Constitution. The teaching of the Constitution is always an integral part of the history courses. This year Mrs. Merritt, Mr. Bomholt, Mr. Hoffman and Mr. Brown devised a unit to reenact the Constitutional Convention of 1787, featuring the actual delegates and issues of the original assembly. Students were divided into the 13 original states and were assigned the role of the delegates who were at the actual convention in Philadelphia.



The teachers required that each student keep a daily journal. The presiding officer opened the floor for debate on all topics, and he received very responsive feedback. The students actually rewrote the U.S. Constitution. Many of the issues led to intensely heated discussions between the northern states and the southern states.

This unit created high interest among the students and gave them a thorough understanding of the people and the issues surrounding the Philadelphia Convention of 1787.






with red carpet, trees with shimmering lights, and benches produced a festive atmosphere for the occasion. Two hundred and sixty people attended the event.







The source of your information






Guest speaker and Tap Day make top events






Clubs plan active year for members


The purpose of the science club is to have fun and to learn about science related items at the same time. Mr. Huffman and Mrs. Yates were the sponsors again this year.




The computer is used in Mr. Huffman's class by his physics and chemistry students. They use the computer to do calculations and to store and print data.






The creativity process begins with students






Elwood High School students, teachers, and administrators are pleased when graduates return to share their successes and experiences.






# Tennis Teams Have Success




At Elwood High School there definitely was a visible difference in volleyball this year, and the girls should be very proud of their hard work and dedication.










# Wrestlers Win Sectional






# Boys Golf

Also breaking a record was Melanie Tolle who set a new mark in the 300 hurdles with a time of :53.62.

For the boys' track team for the '88 season the most memorable event was the 400M relay team breaking both the school and C.I.C. records with a time of :44.55. This team, consisting of Jay Courtney, Jason Kleinbub, Mike Davis, and Derek Paquin, captured first place in the C.I.C. and fifth in the sectional.

"The most valuable member

this year was Derek Paquin. Along with capturing first place in the 100M and 200M runs several times during the regular season, Derek placed 1st and 2nd in the C.I.C. in these events. Derek was the fastest runner we've had in at least 5-6 years," stated Coach Goens.

Jay Courtney received the trophy for being the outstanding full time member of the track team. In addition to running on the 400M relay team, he advanced to the Kokomo regional in the pole vault.

# Panthers Improve

The varsity baseball team finished its season with a 12-10-2 record. This put the Panthers two games over .500, one of Coach Bomholt's and the players' goals for the season. 




The old and the new can be seen in downtown Elwood. Some old buildings have been torn down for new buildings, but some buildings remain for the town's history.







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




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
