The auto body and welding technology programs are two year programs for high school and post-secondary people who are interested in learning the trade. Students enrolled in these classes come from Elwood as well as neighboring schools. Mr. Phillip Kidwell teaches auto body, and Mr. Kenneth Harris teaches welding. These programs were developed to meet the needs of industry and prepare trainees to fill these occupations. Concepts that are used in industry
are also the concepts that are taught in the program. The purpose of these courses is to prepare the students to become productive and useful citizens in their respective communities. Upon completion of the full course the student should have entry level skills to enter the trade or apprenticeship programs of auto body or welding. All students become members of Vocational Industrial Clubs of America (VICA) as a part of their leadership training, social, and competitive
outcome. Local banquets are held, and services are performed as well as student participation in state, regional, and national VICA contests. We are proud to have had many winners in the state competitions. This year Elwood Community High School had two students as VICA state officers, Mark Thornberry as vice-president and J.R. Reese as state reporter. They worked very hard planning VICA activities.

What started as a class project for Mr. Bomholt's economics class ended in a donation to the national debt and coverage on Channel 6 News. For the first time the economics class, assisted by consultant Mark Ellison, formed a student company. The class elected officers and then performed market surveys to select a product to sell. The class chose squeeze bottles, and they then ordered the bottles from the Pride Company of Bloomfield, Michigan. The company, 3 B Enterprises, sold 195 bottles at $\$ 4.00$ each, netting a profit of $\$ 63.42$ after taxes, salaries, and commissions were subtracted. It was then that one student, Gina Deavers, suggested that
the class donate the money to the national debt. A representative from Dan Burton's office, John Price, was contacted, and he, along with Angela Cain of Channel 6, Fran Hoffman of the Elwood Call Lead$e r$, and a reporter from the Anderson Herald, arrived at the school on October 19 to accept the donation to the government and to cover the event. On October 18 Dan Burton made the following entry into the Congressional Record.

Mr. Burton of Indiana, "Mr. Speaker, the majority of the American people want the budget problem solved, and they want it solved now. I believe that the people want this problem solved in such a way
that they won't have to pay a great deal of additional taxes. I believe that they want to see a solution that focuses on spending cuts instead of tax increases on an already overburdened populace.
Mr. Speaker, I have here a letter from the students of Elwood Community High School that demonstrates the concern that the people of the Sixth District of Indiana have about this problem. I think the students of Elwood High School express very well, not only the sentiments of the people of the Sixth District, but the sentiments of all Americans. These students and their teachers should be commended."
