



Styles of 1991 are a look from the 60's and the 70's and a touch of the new. Styles today are your own creative ideas, either old or new.






Several of the teachers at ECHS had not planned on being teachers. They said they would rather be doing various activities.




Health teacher Ms. Johnson would rather spend all of her time playing the lottery, hoping to hit the jackpot.











The Advance College Project classes were offered by Indiana University. There were three college credit classes available this year: English W-131, English L-102, and Calculus M-215.


English W-131 was taught first semester. Summary, synthesis, critical evaluation, were skills covered in 2-6 page papers. English W-102 was offered 2nd semester. This class emphasized skills used in the art of reading. Class discussions and short critical responses were skills covered in the study of poetry, drama, and fiction. Several historical periods were studied.





SOUNDS Sing Out A Song


The Elwood Community High School choir experienced a year of performances, competition, and the presentation of beautiful sounds.

For the first time in 30 years Elwood Community High School hosted the Madison County Choral Festival. It was held on March 19.











After 27 years as a high school teacher, Mrs. Joanne Sullivan is retiring her skilled ability to educate students in the classroom. Yet, she will carry many fascinating experiences and memorable occasions with her on her future expeditions.

Mrs. Sullivan became interested in journalism at a young age when she worked for a newspaper as a high school student. Her late husband was also a journalism major, and his father owned a small town newspaper where she was once employed.

As a student she attended Alexandria High School and then received a Bachelor of Arts Degree and a Masters Degree of Arts from Ball State University. Her majors include business, English, and journalism.

Before her employment with the Elwood School coorperation, she served an eight year tenure at Mississenewa High School, and began teaching at Elwood High School in 1973. During her 24 years of employment Mrs. June Van Wagner has served as the guidance director, cheerleader sponsor, and freshman volleyball coach. She also instituted girls' basketball, volleyball, and track in the 1970's.

Mrs. VanWagner's creative attitude is expressed every year at the final home boys' basketball game. She writes a special poem for each senior team member, cheerleader, or manager which everyone enjoys greatly and demonstrates her dedication to students.

A determined, strongwilled, and hopeful attitude was an important key in Mrs. Darren Paquin's victory over a failing heart. In 1985 Mrs. Paquin contracted a virus that attacked her heart and caused damage to her heart. Doctors told her that she had six weeks to a year to live. She conquered the odds by surviving the deterioration. Then in 1989 she suffered sudden cardiac death while in her vearbook class. Mr. Huffman, Mr. Pantos, and Mr. Paquin performed CPR until the paramedics arrived. Doctors implanted a difibrillator which regulated the heartbeat, actually shocking her with electricity if it stopped or exceeded 175 beats per minute.

The defibrallator restarted her heart three times before she received a heart transplant on January 22, 1992. Mrs. Paquin had been on a waiting list since August 1991. Once again she survived the odds and regained her strength quickly after the transplant. She will return to her classes in the fall of 92.





























The freshmen ended the year at 3-4. **Kristin Robinson** won the positive mental attitude award.












Eleven records were broken and the boys set a school record for the most points scored in one meet at a home meet against Westfield with 121 points scored. The boys had a record setting year!





Coach Kirkwood commented about the girls' season this year, "We made a lot of progress toward our long term goals. I was really pleased with the overall effort and improvement of everyone."


