The next meet was at Gas City. The team had improved quite a bit and gave a good account of themselves. Fairmount took first in the low hurdles, 440 yard dash, and the mile relay.

The meet with Montpelier was a success only in that the team showed much improvement. The weather was nicer, and the boys enjoyed running. They showed this by finishing only 11 points behind Montpelier, the host team.

In the Kokomo Relays the five points for Fairmount were gained by Charles Smith in winning the low hurdles. His time was $24: 4$.
