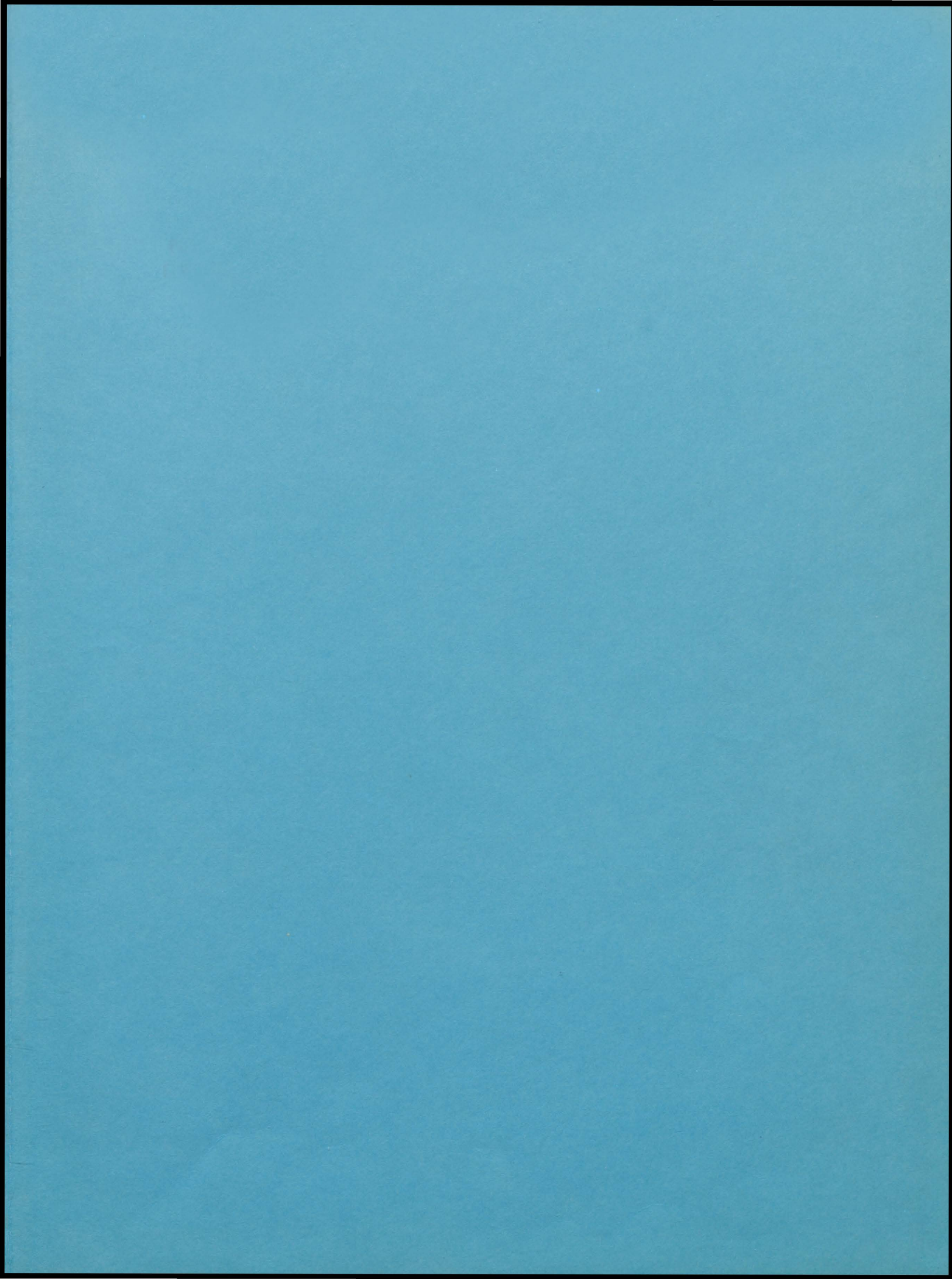

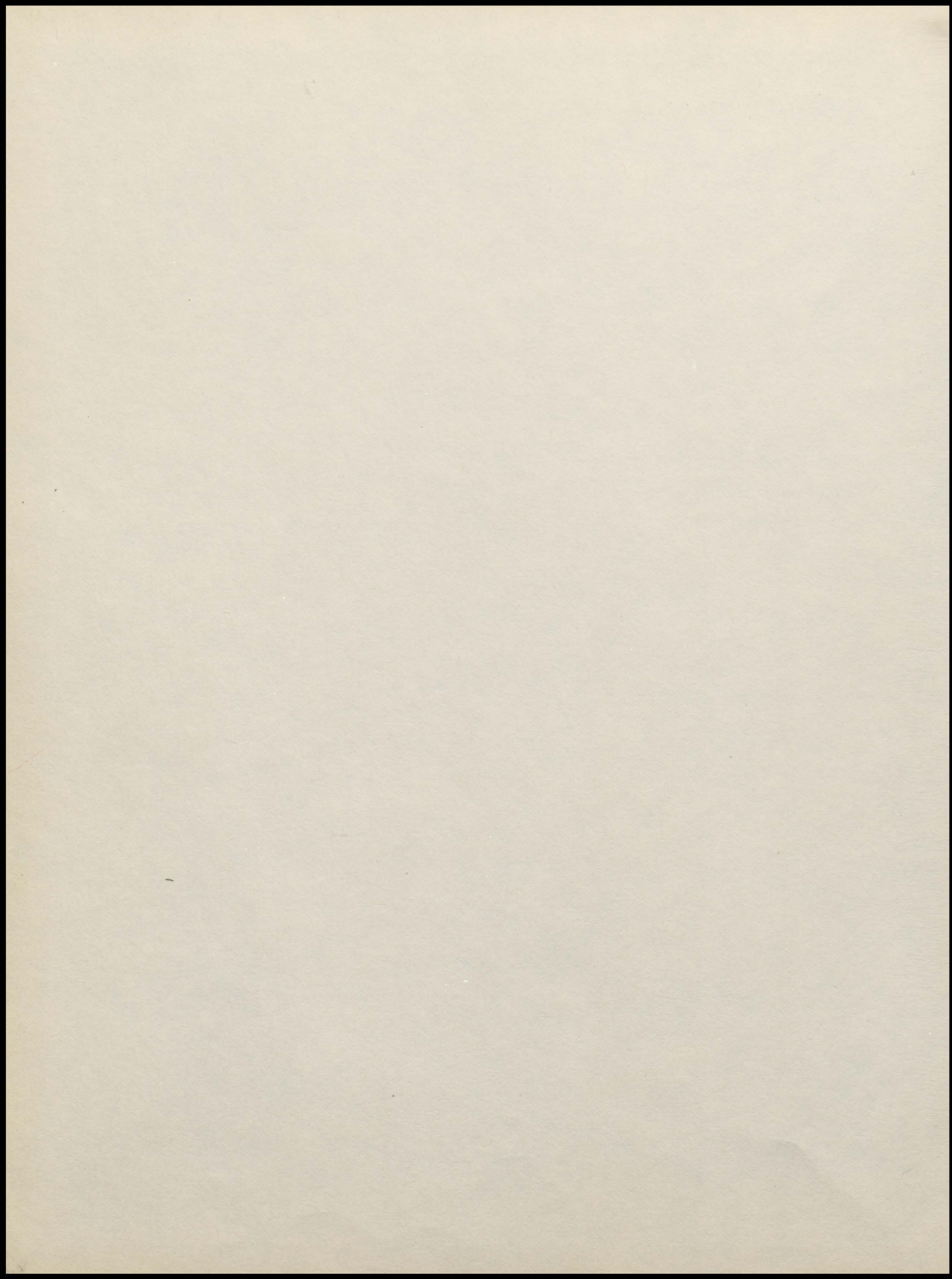

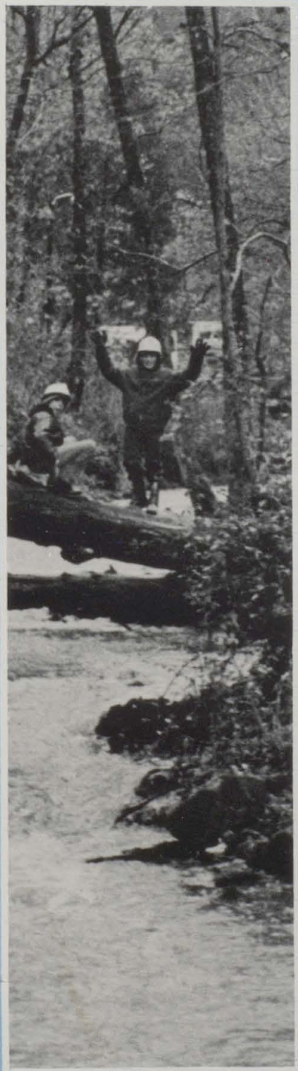

Also, you could have been a queen for Homecoming waiting for that big moment just like Kristi McClelland as she was crowned Homecoming Queen for 1975.

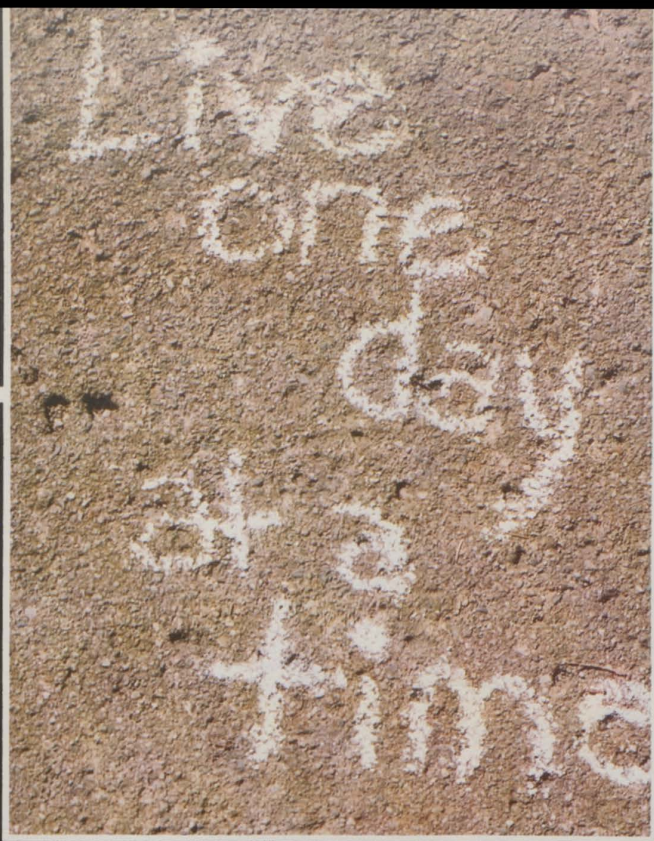
We've touched on a few things that students enjoy most. By doing this, they

"Jaws" was a thrill-packed terrifying movie which brought large crowds to theaters all over the country.

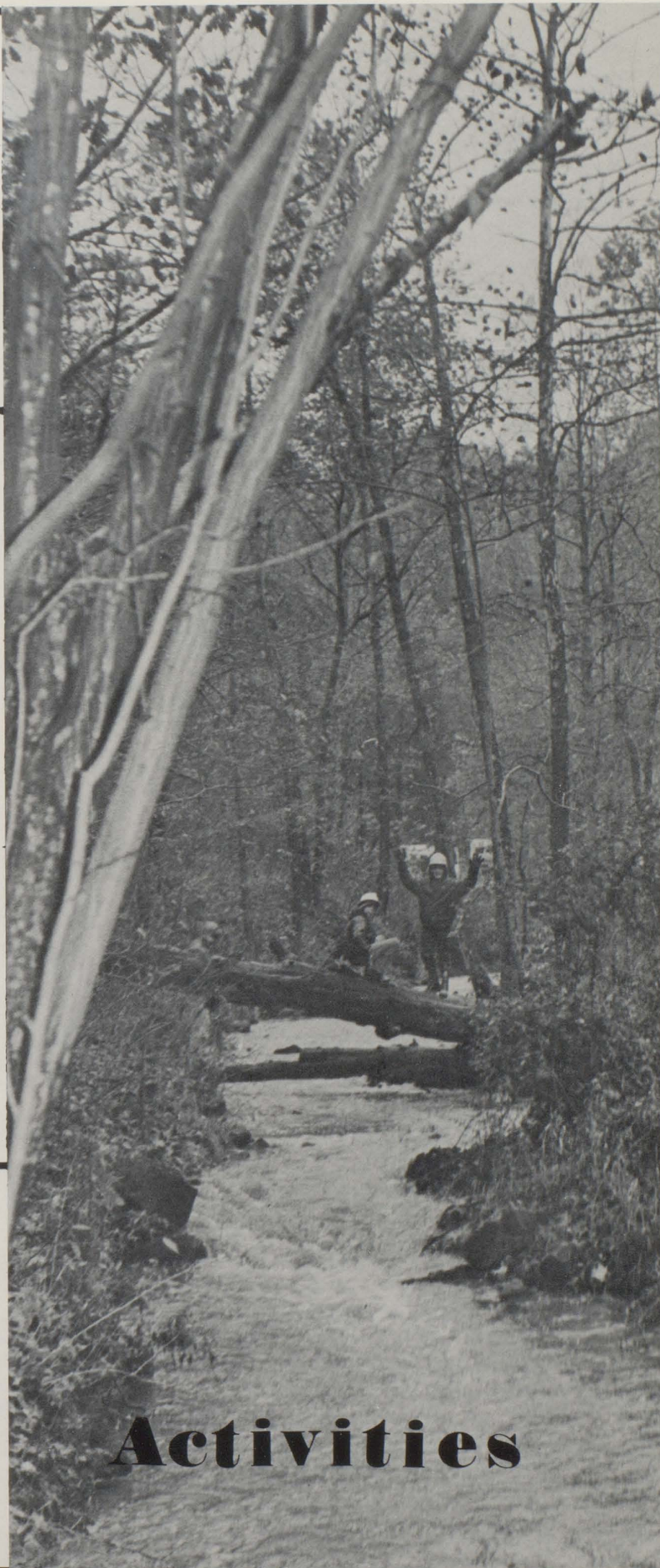
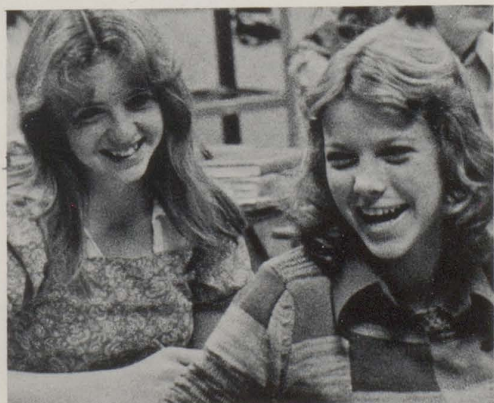
"Rhoda", one of the favorite TV shows of many, kept Americans glued to the tube in '76.

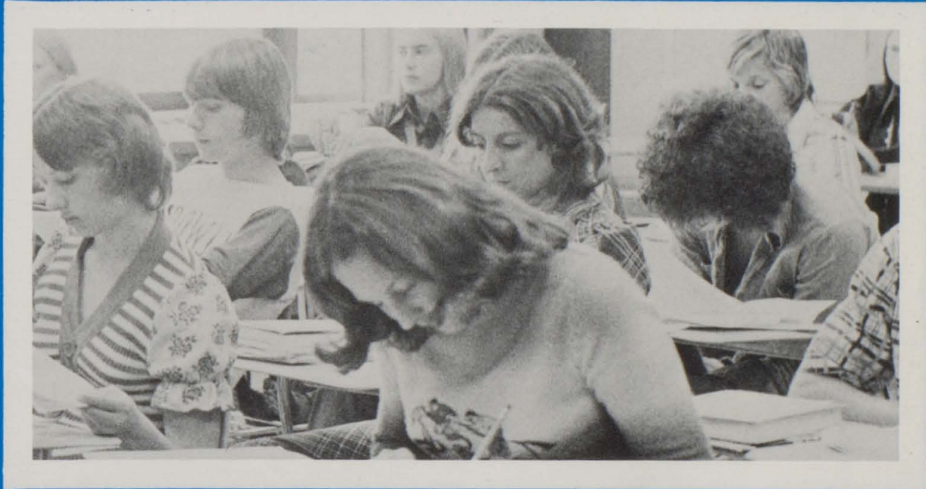
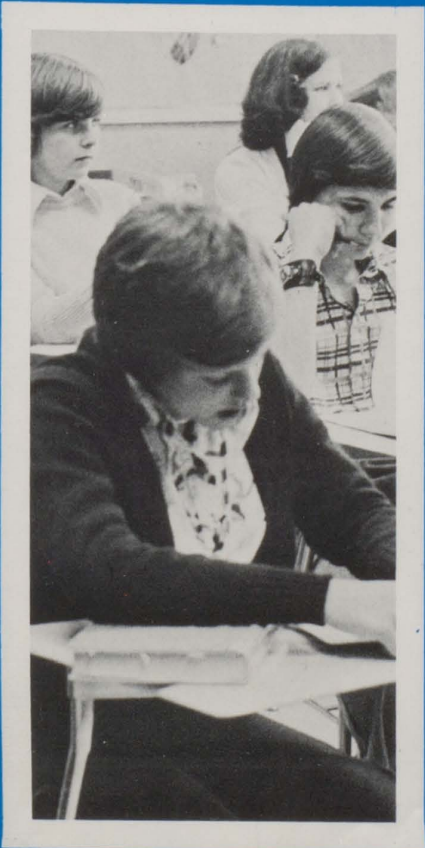

Do you like sports, or maybe you're another John Wayne and would like to act, or maybe you even want to be like Hercules and learn about mythology.

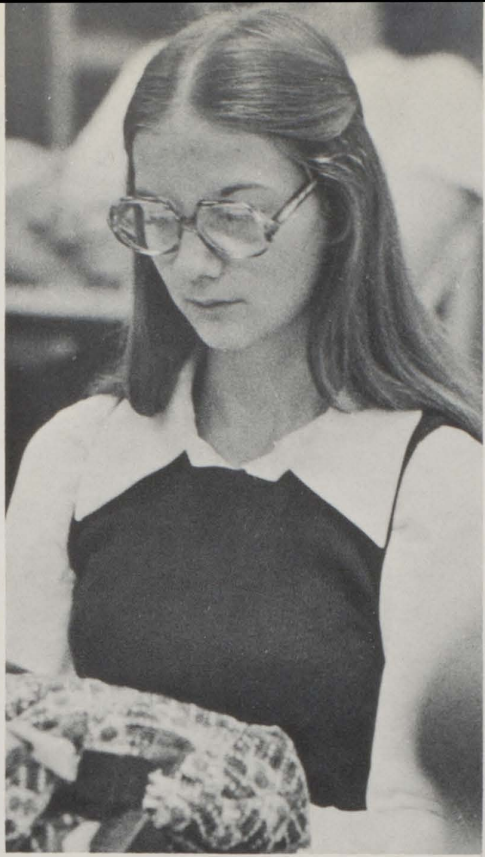
The English classes offered at Elwood Community High School teach many things that interest many students.

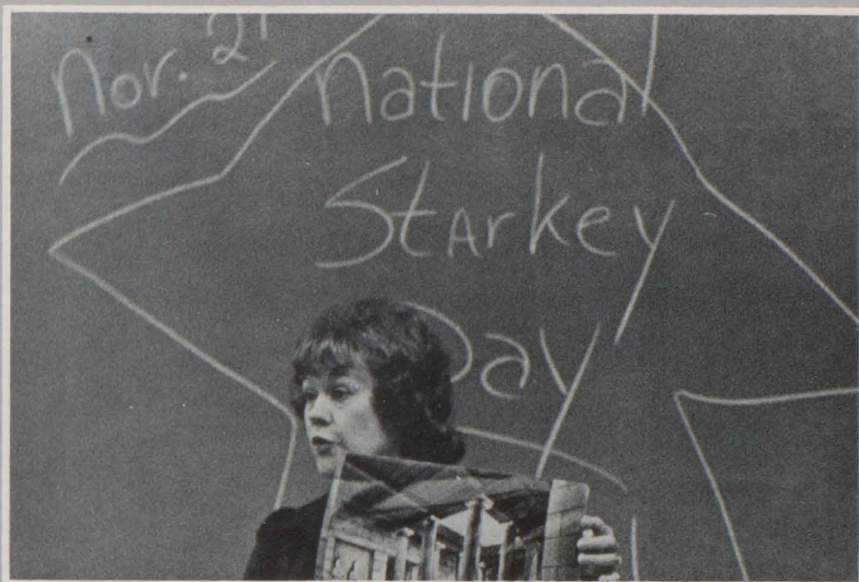

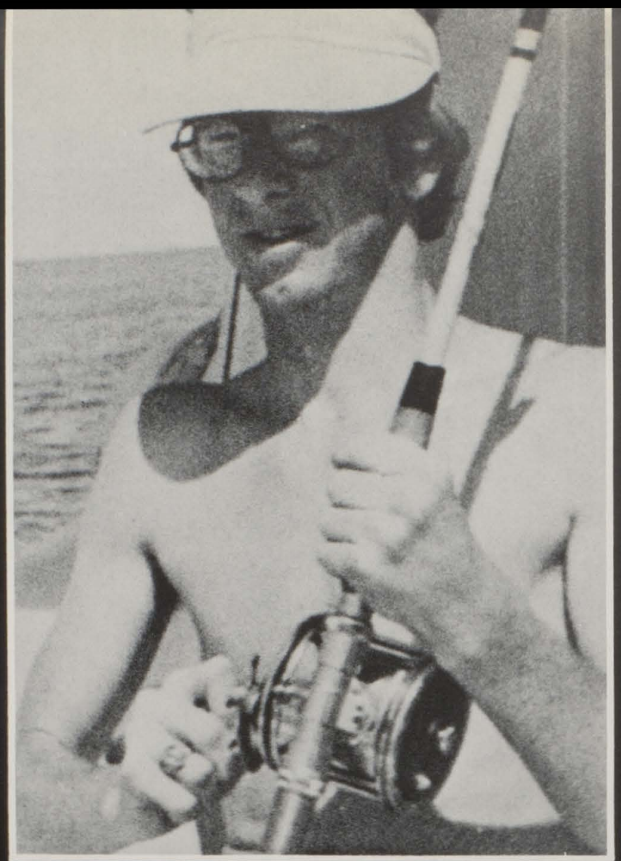
CLUB de ESPAÑOL

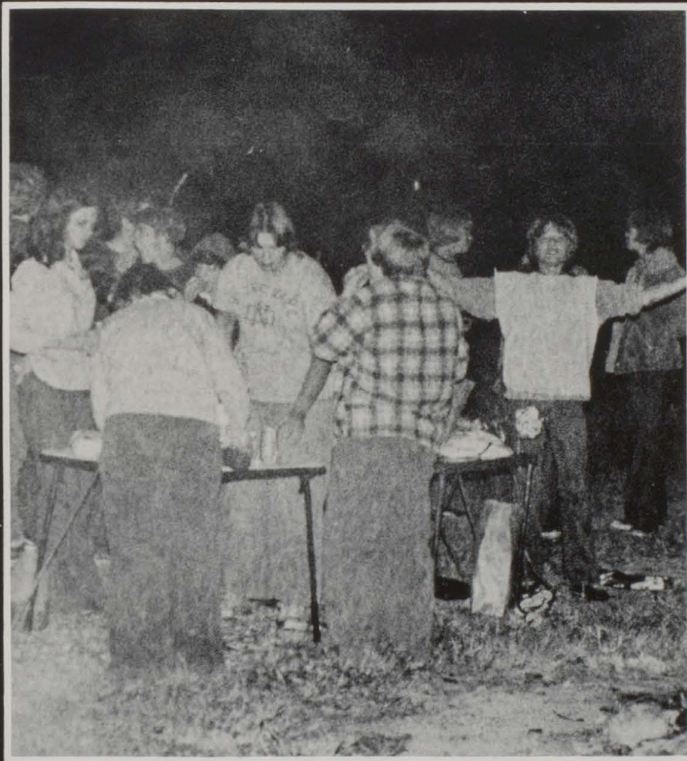
When in Rome do as the Romans do, and when speaking Latin at E. C. H. S. do as the Latinians do.

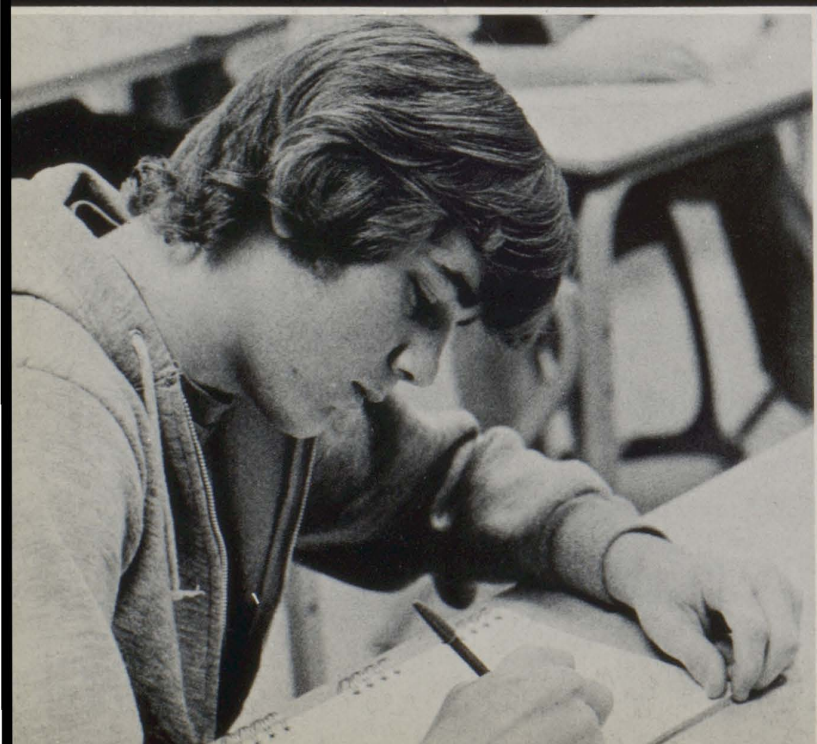

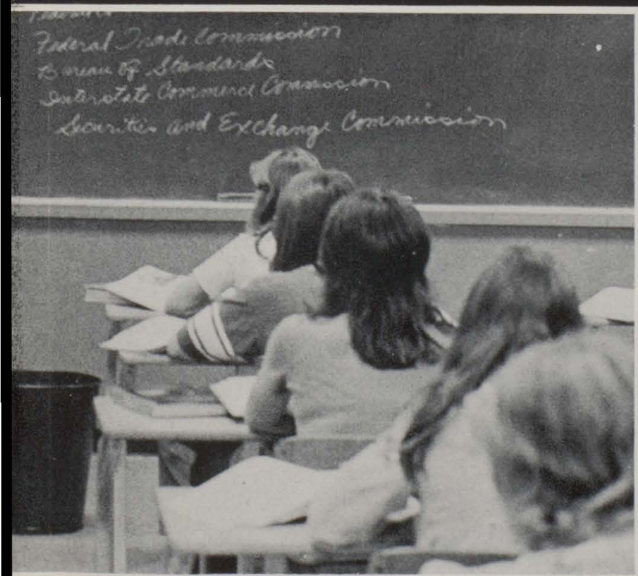

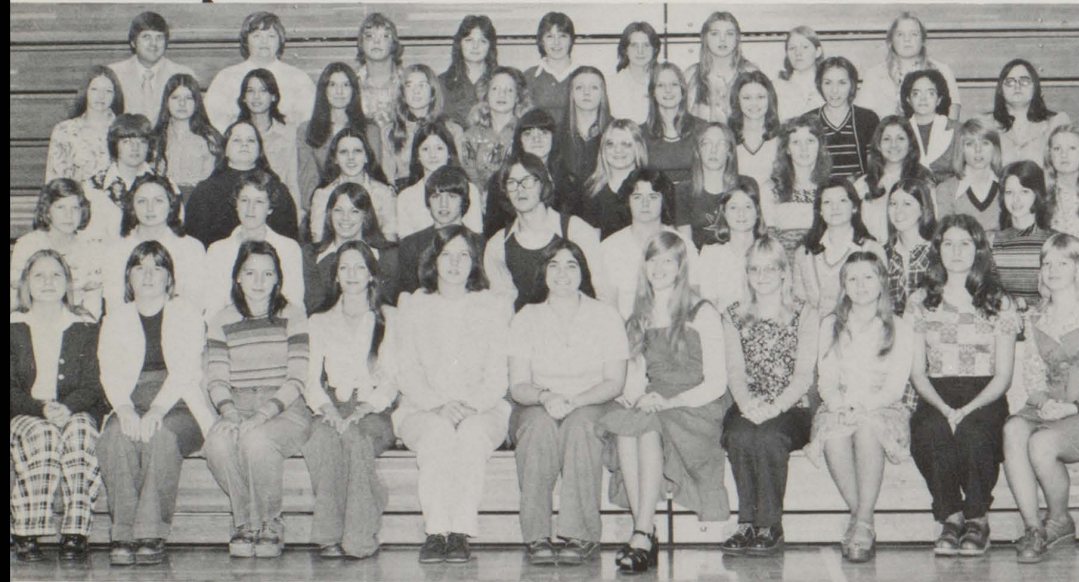
Oakes and the Others

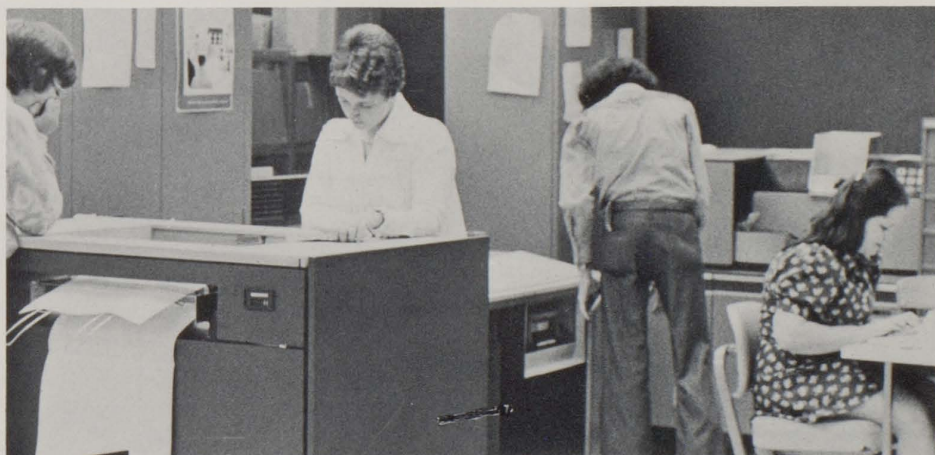
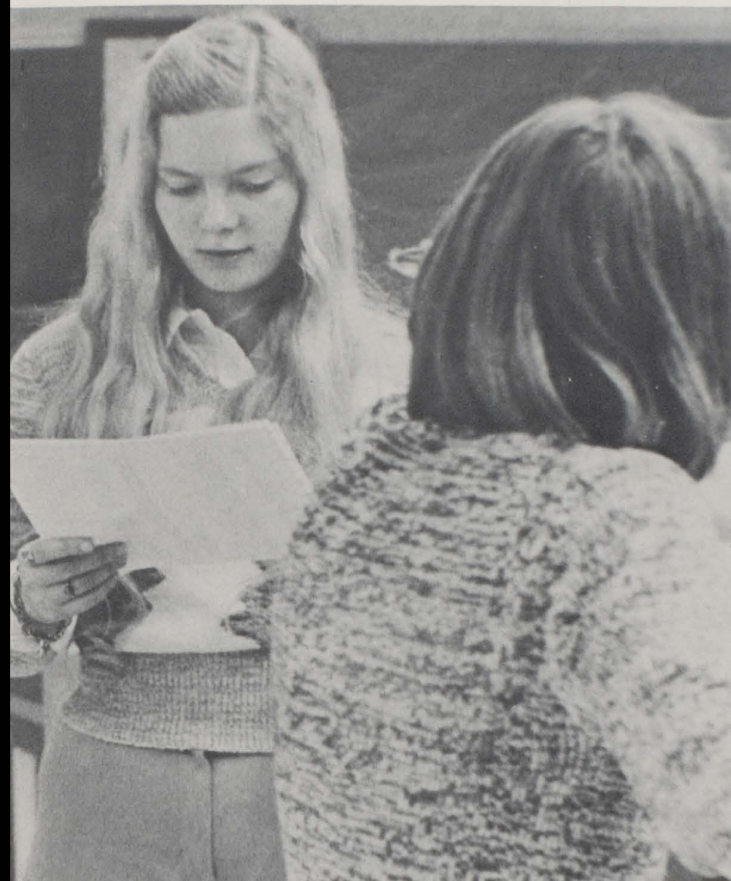

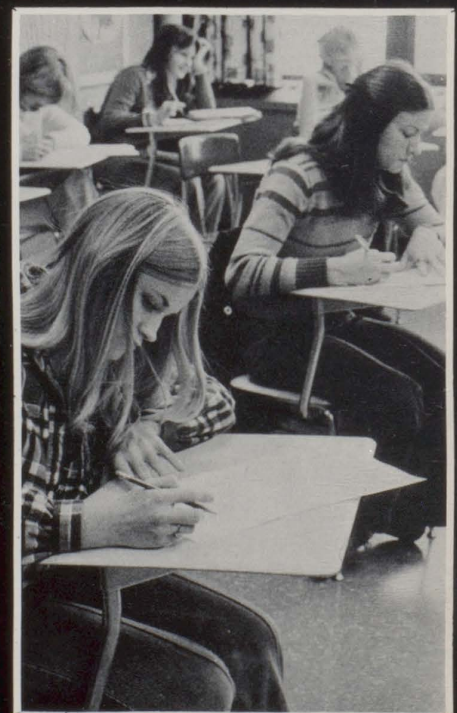
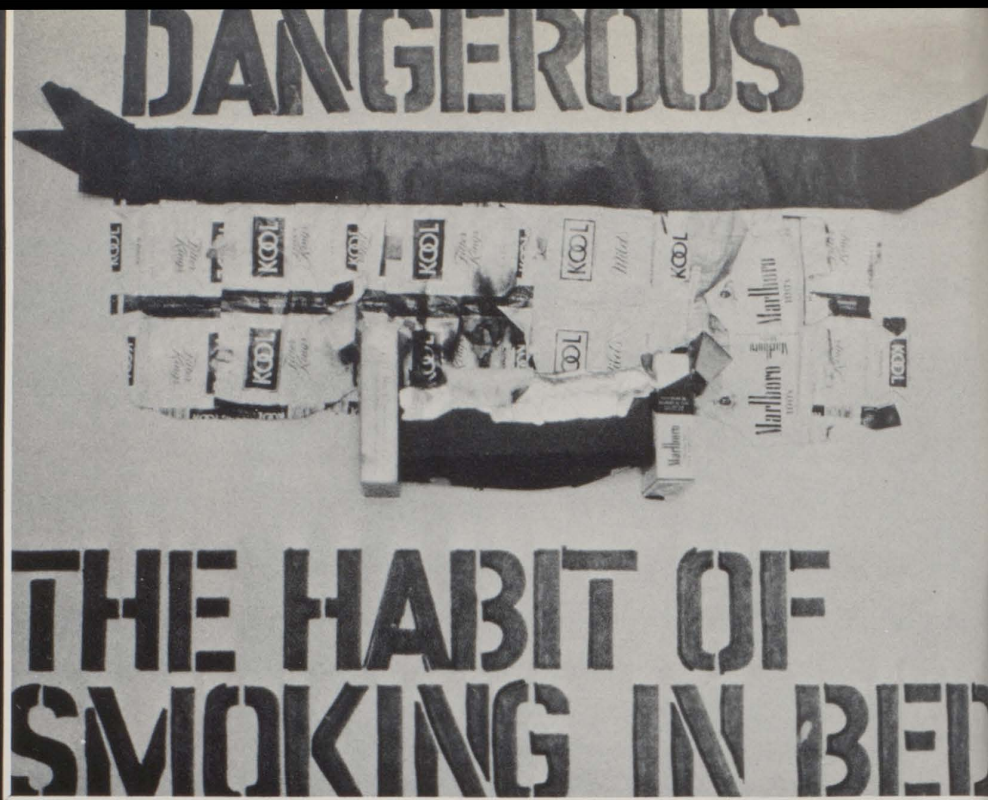

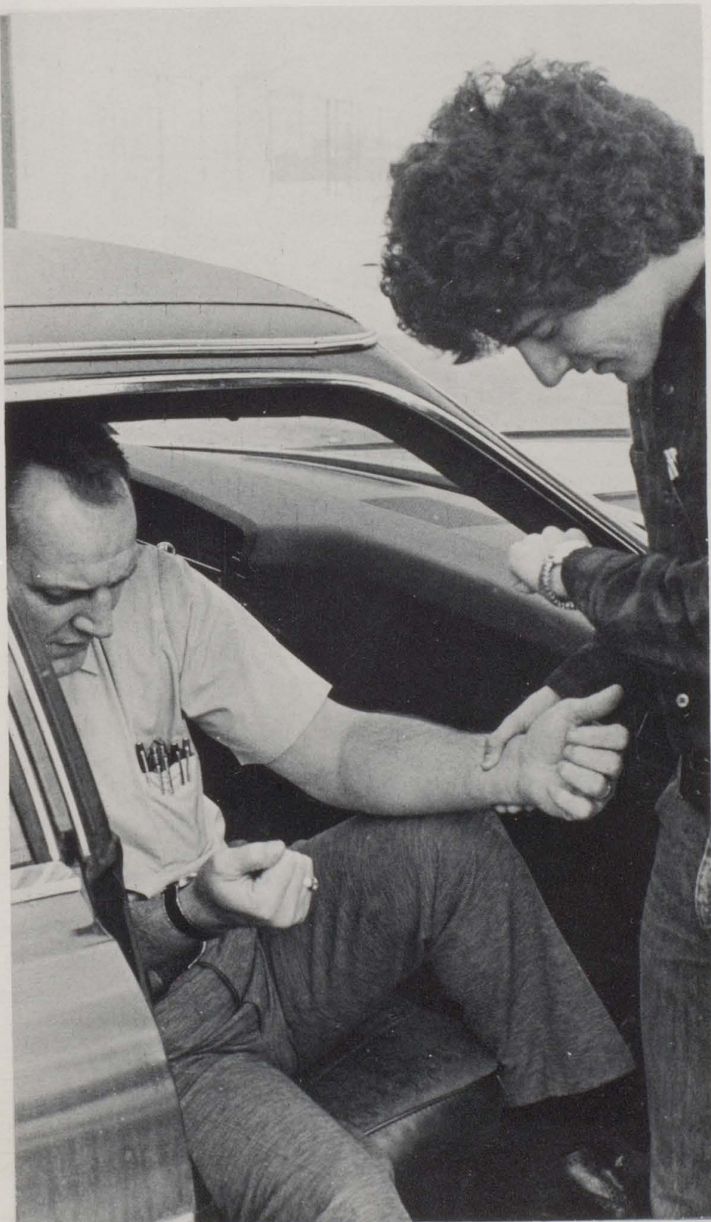
Today Driver's Ed.; Tomorrow the "L"!

Watch out for that little old lady and get me my nerve pills!

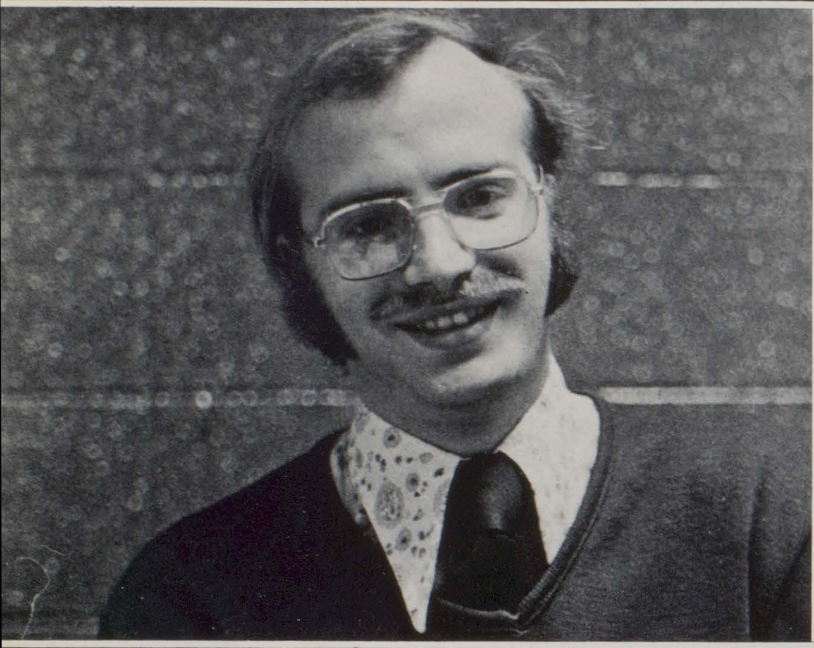

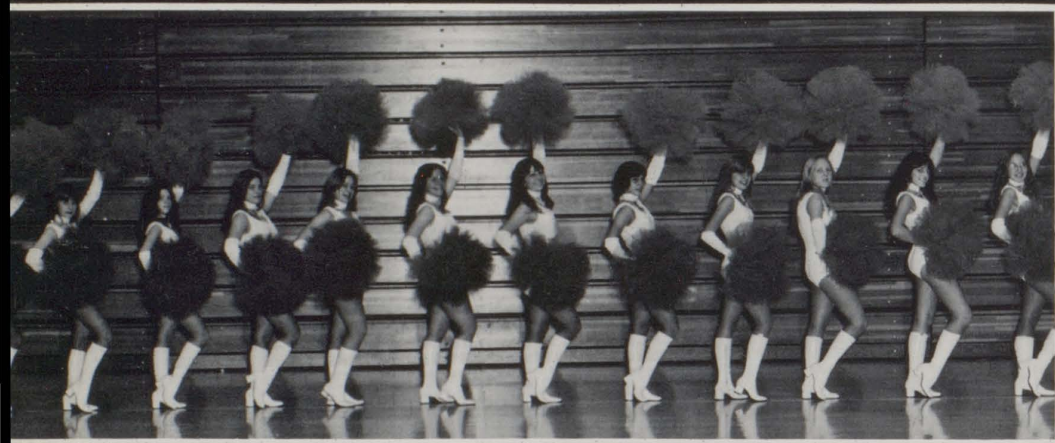
Majorettes, Pom Poms, Choir Perform in Musical Fields

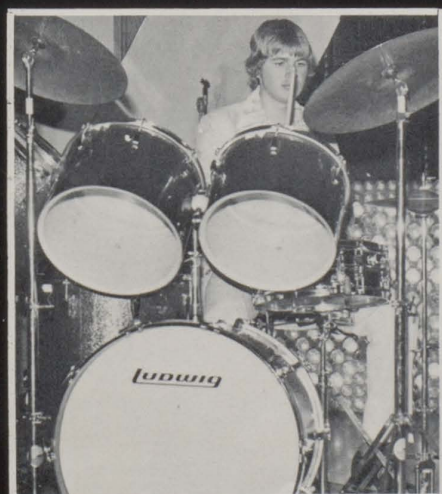

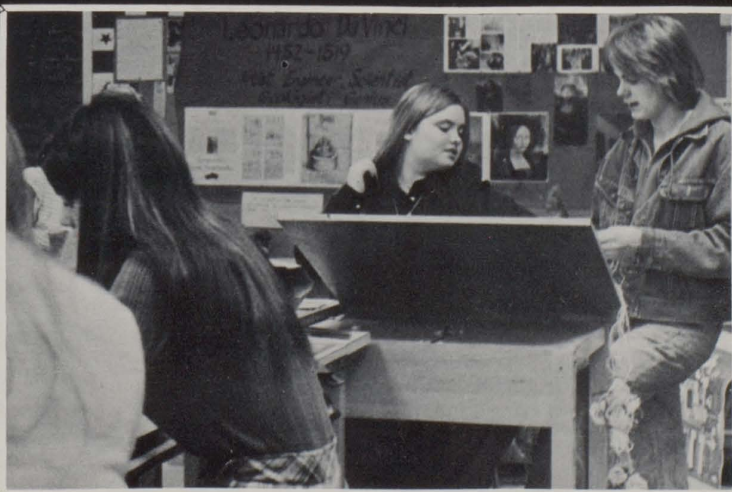

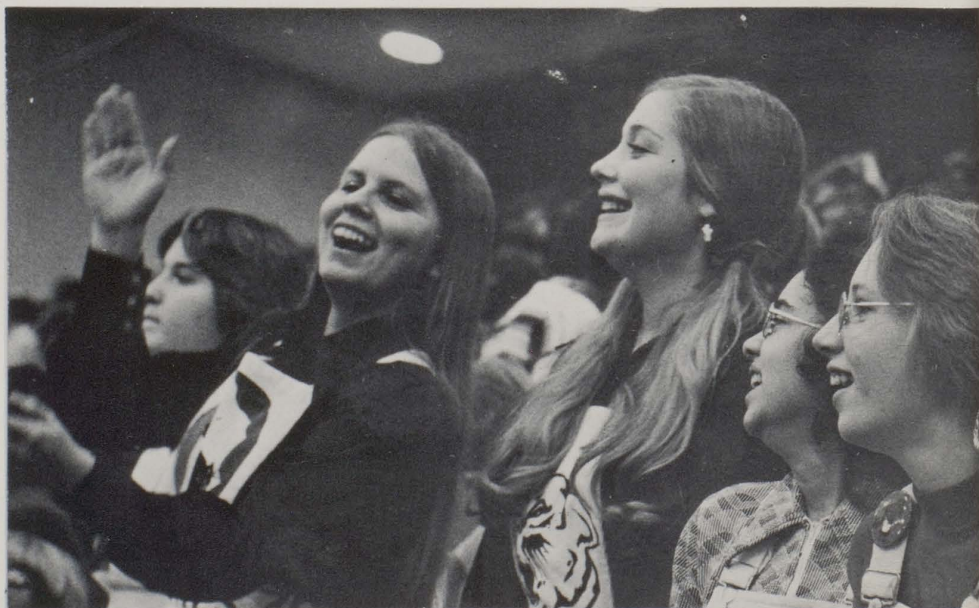

project was making a toy or game which could be used in baby-sitting or as a gift.

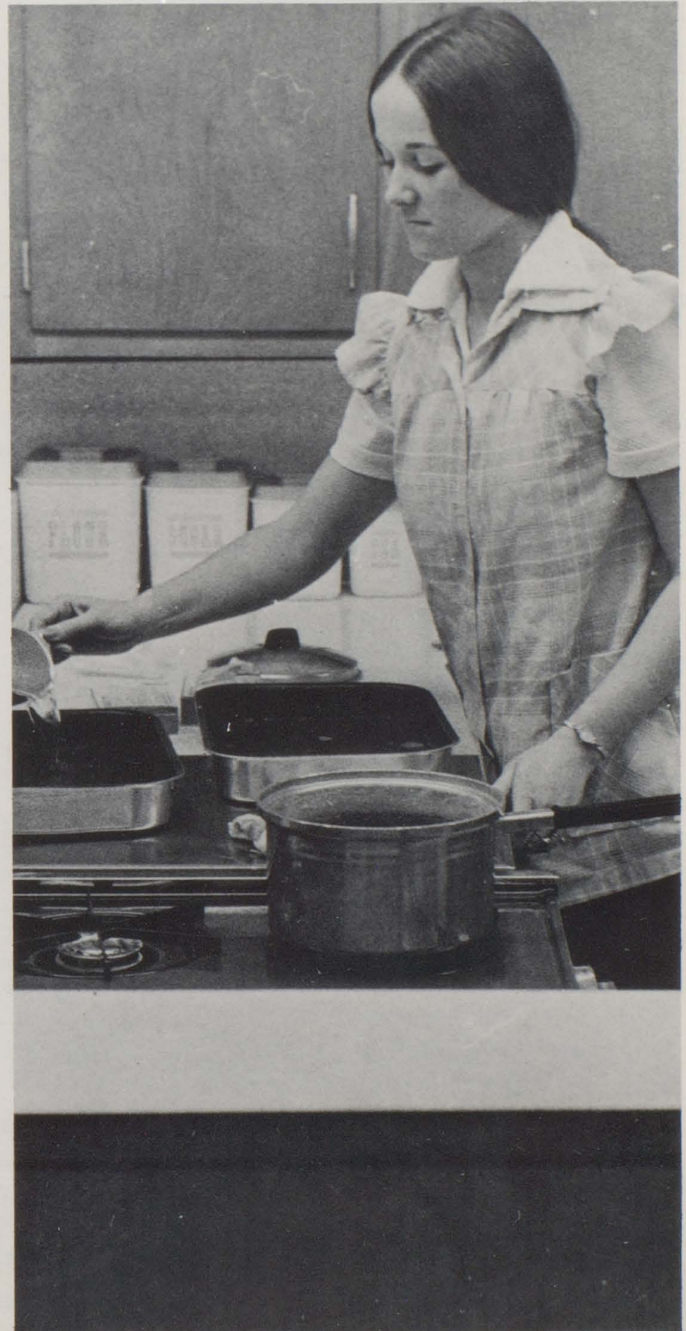
There are thirty-three girls in FHA club, and the projects that they undertook this year were selling Texas fruit cakes and an Easter raffle.

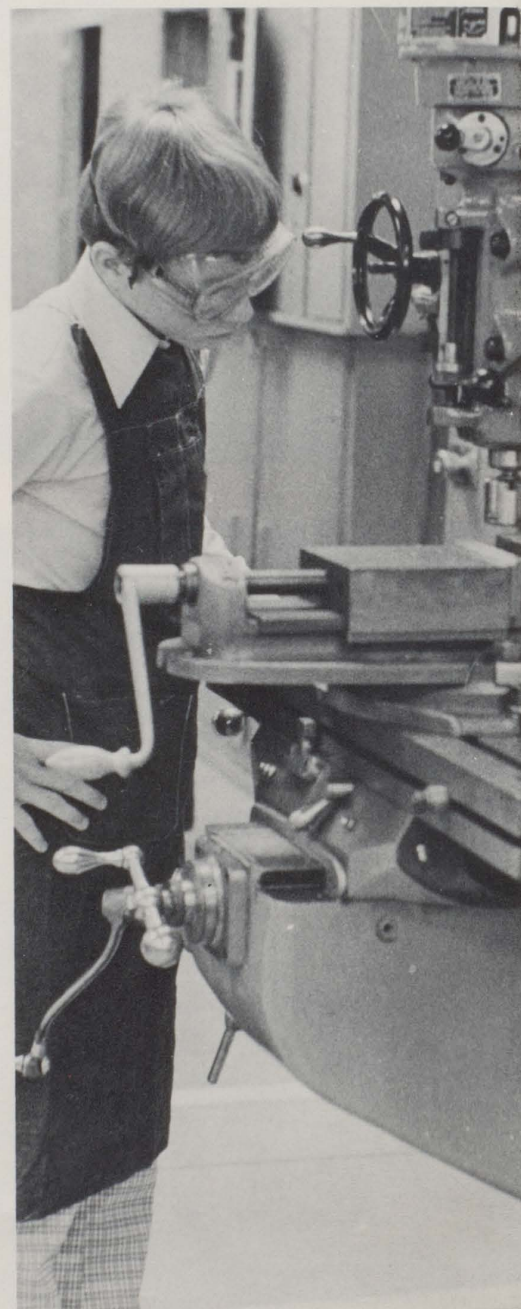
There are twenty-five to thirty different courses offered. Just a few of these are woods, electronics, drafting, and printing.

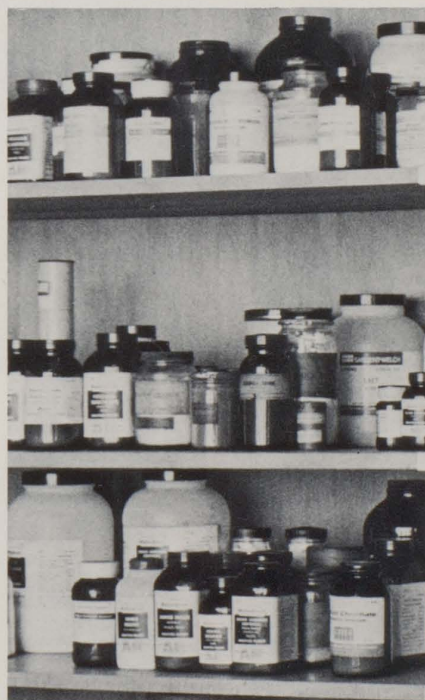
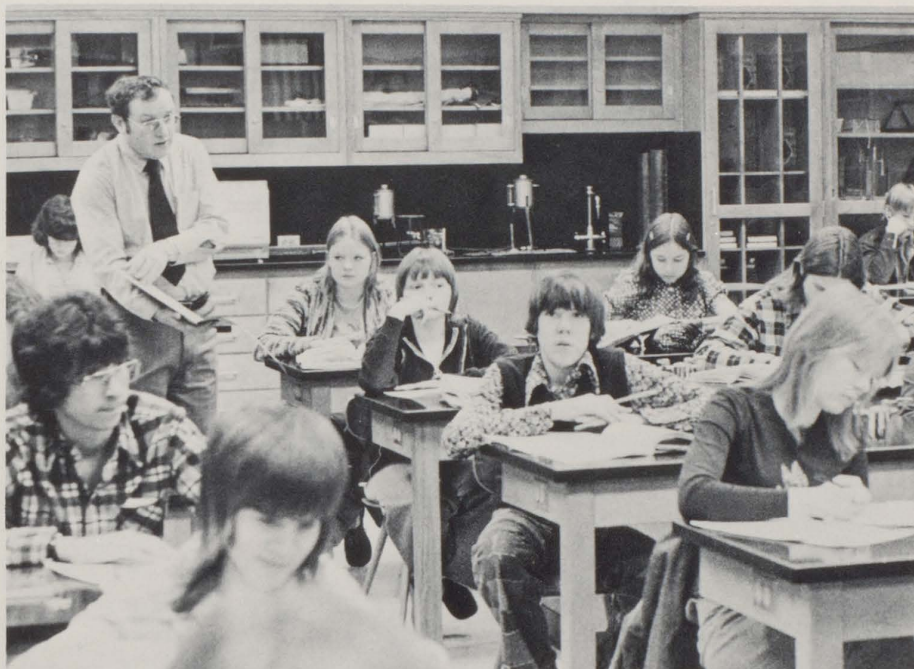

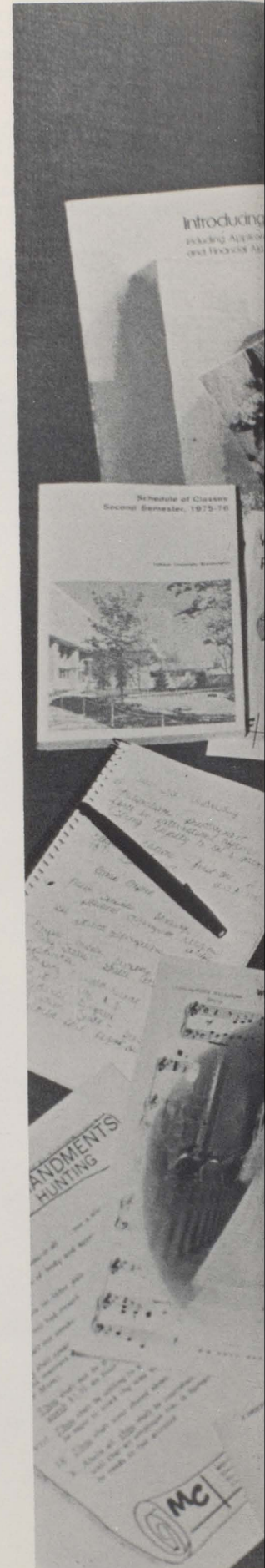

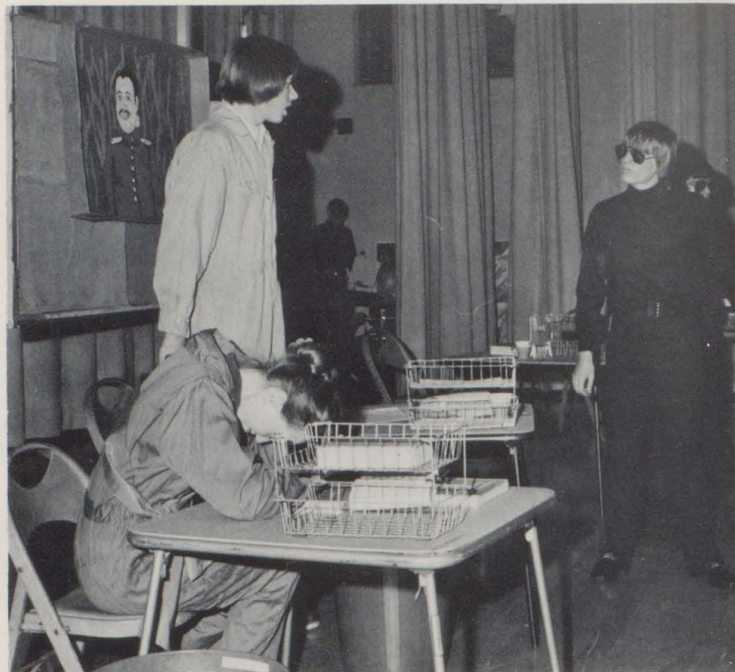
One of the activities that the Thespians had this year was a trip to Anderson College to see the play, "Brigadoon."

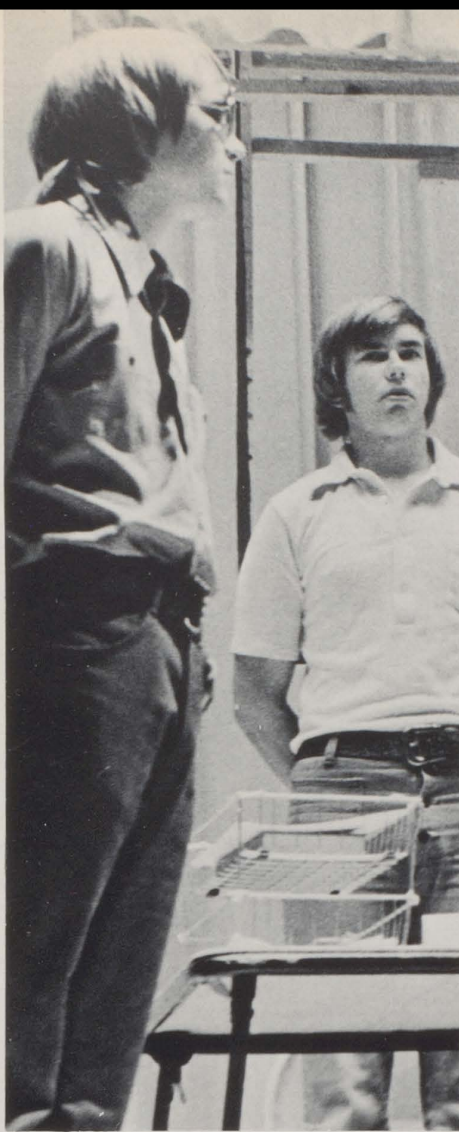

Although there was no definite FEA club during the 1976 school year students remained active in their aims.

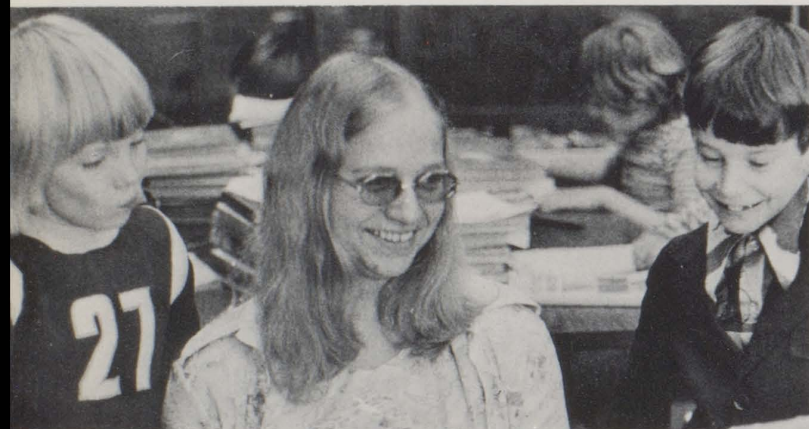

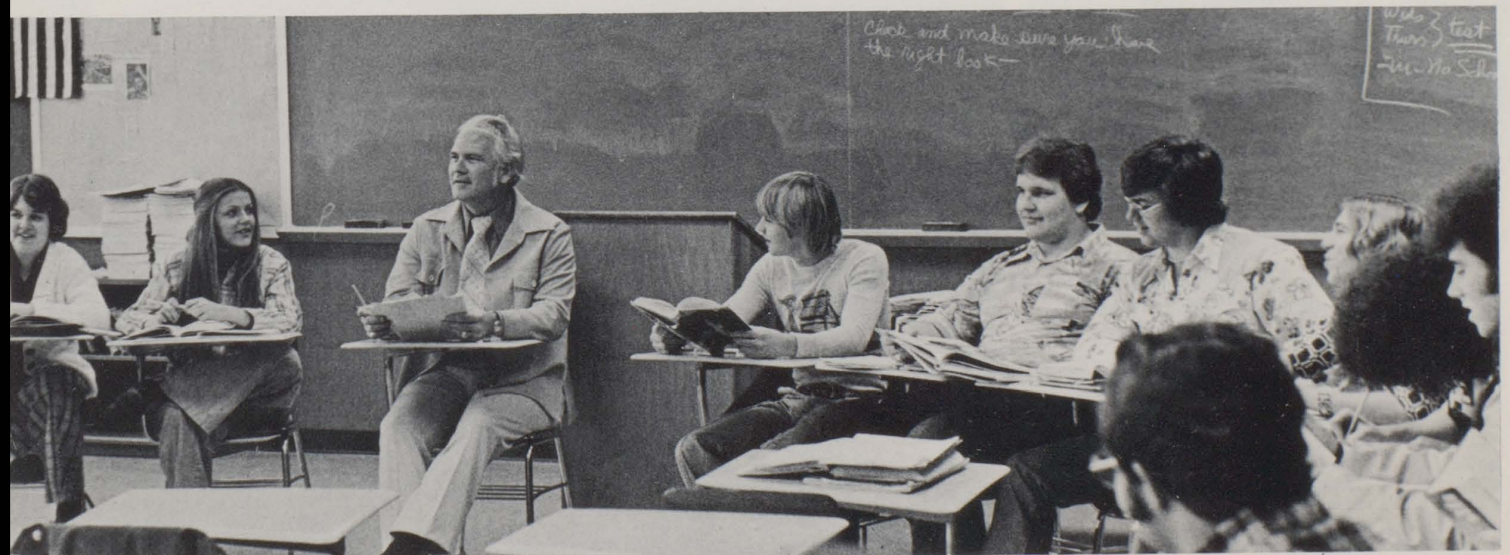
There are many different history classes offered at E. C. H. S. You can take one of the new courses in the history area called current problems. It studies, as the name implies, current problems around us today.

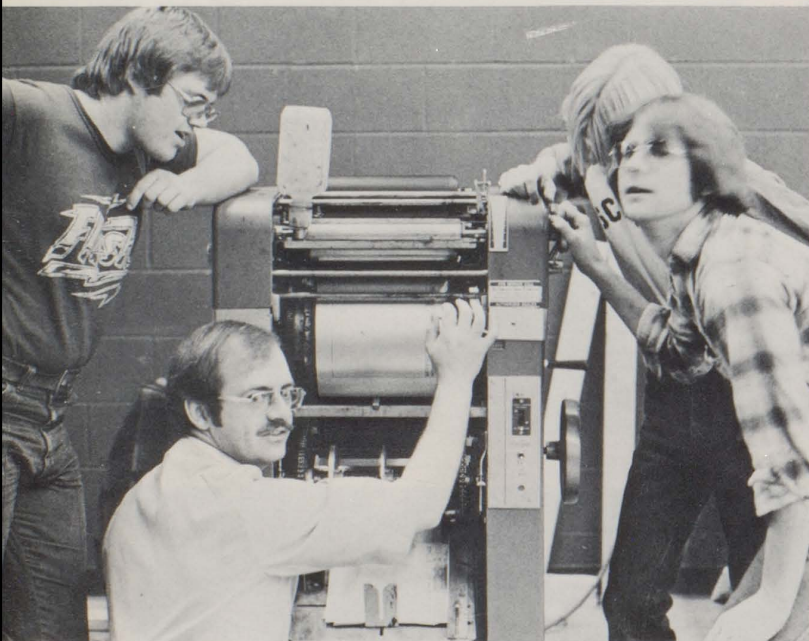
Printing Classes Study New Techniques

The local club has many activities this year including class elections, basketball games, and selling candles.

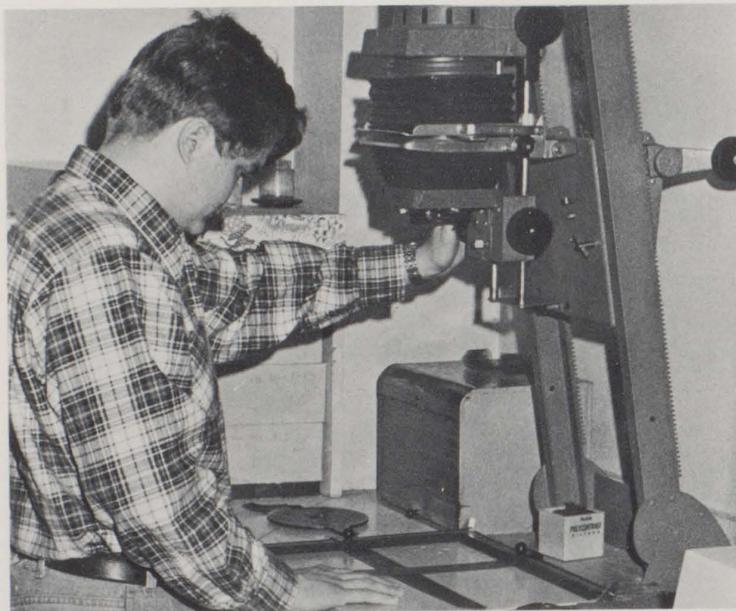
ICT, which is a part of VICA, provides for on-the-job training with many employed in factories and businesses that provide service.

ICT, VHO, and DE have a main goal and that is teaching students to respect their jobs and their employees.



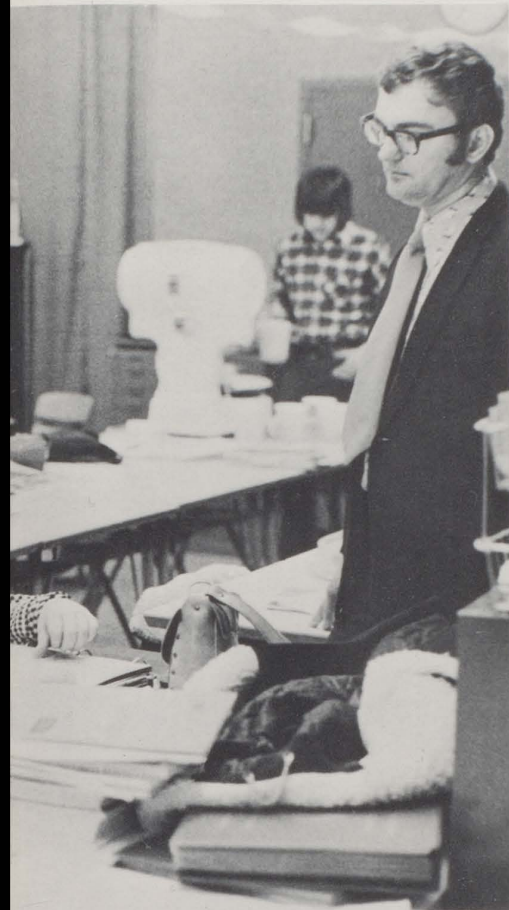

This is the fifth project house in the building trades program done by the students. There is a morning and afternoon section being taught by Mr. Joe Juday and Mr. Earl Watson. Both sections work on the same project which requires careful planning and coordination.

The program is for junior and senior boys who are interested in learning about construction trades. The course is four semesters long and covers many skills such as plastering, bricklaying,

heating, and ventilating. The class meets for three hours per day and gives three credits per semester and is offered primarily for those boys who expect, upon graduation from high school, to become apprentices in one of the construction trades.

Building trades class has been responsible for almost all of the work to complete the house. The students learn by doing, and the project house serves as a means whereby they can practice and apply their skills and knowledge.

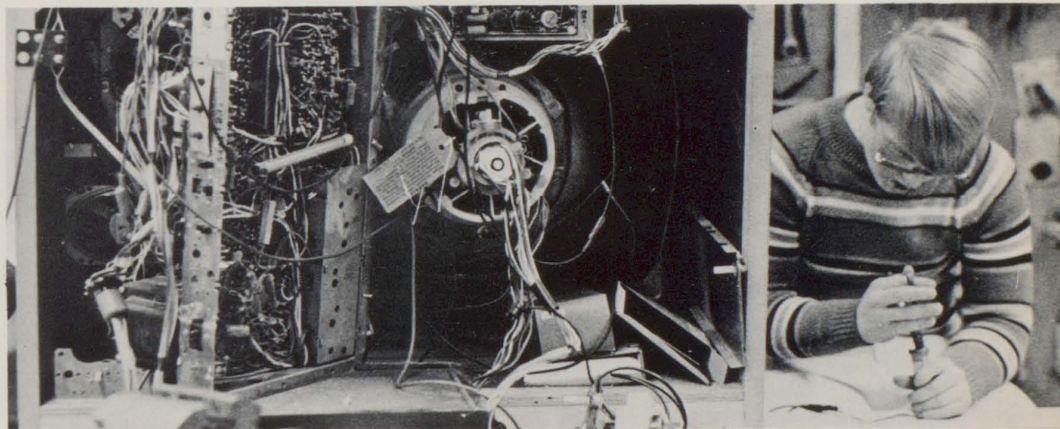
TOOLS, TOOLS, & MORE TOOLS

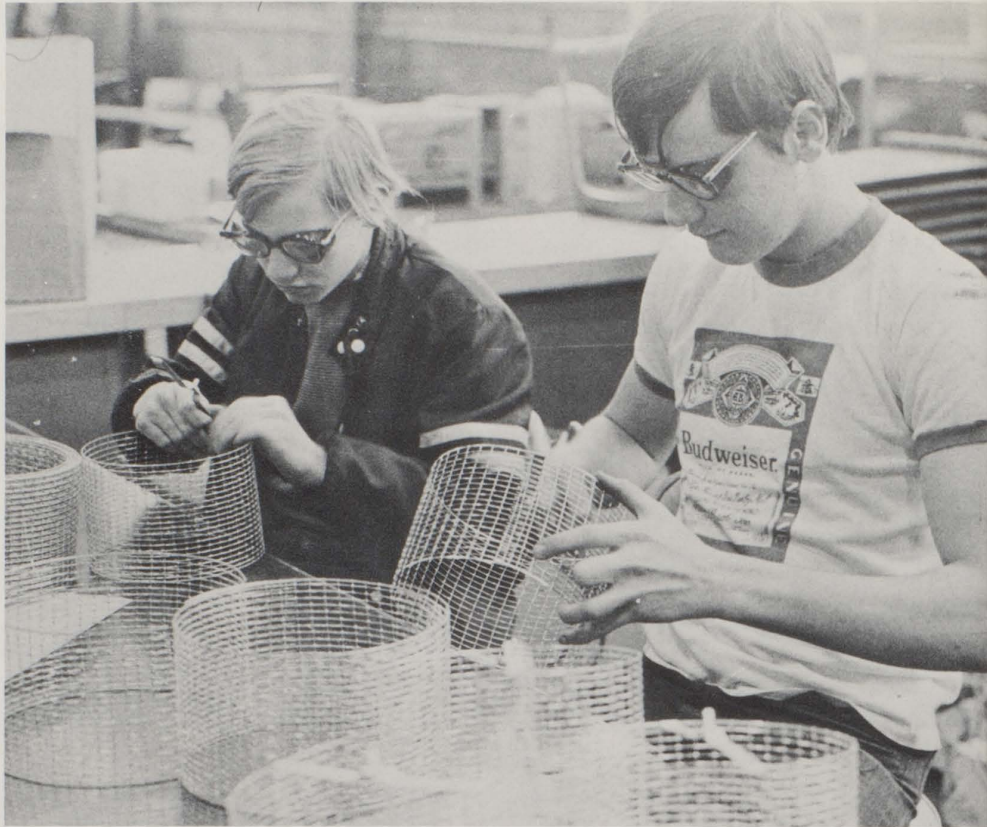


PVE stands for Pre-employment Vocational Education and is a specialized type of training. Their goals are to teach job skills and job discipline.

PVE is a cooperative between the firms and the school. The firms furnish the tools and specialized equipment, if needed.

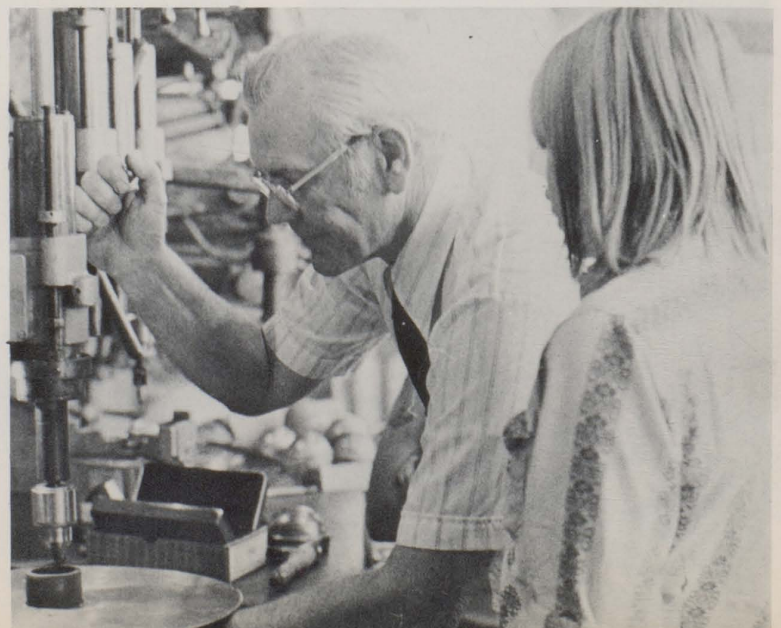
In weekly rotation, students are assigned to various personnel. They elect a superintendent, two foremen, and various clean-up operations to keep things in the shop neat and clean.

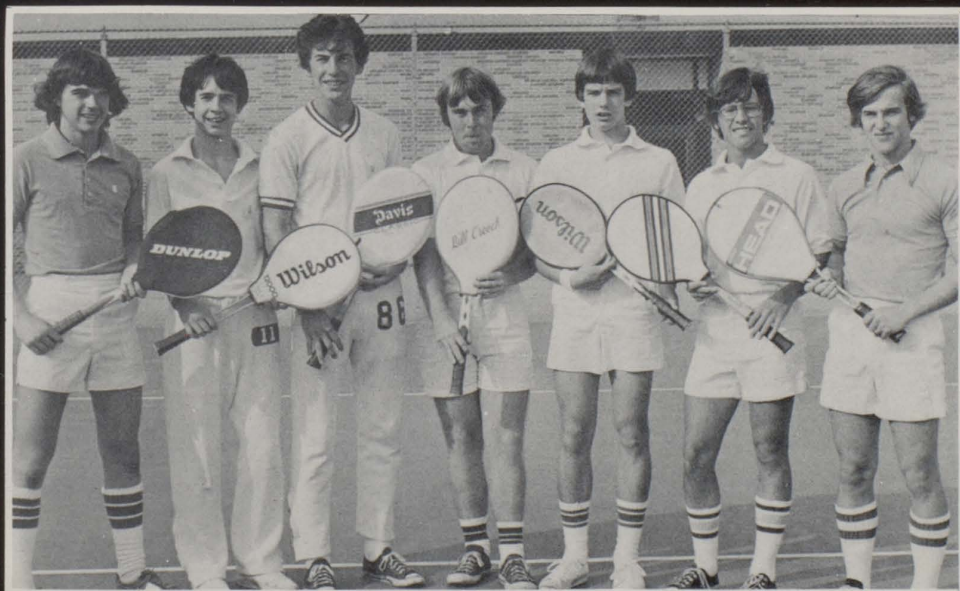
The Elwood Panther golf team came through with a good season this year due to a lot of effort. New coach Tom Austin helped the team improve and look to the future.

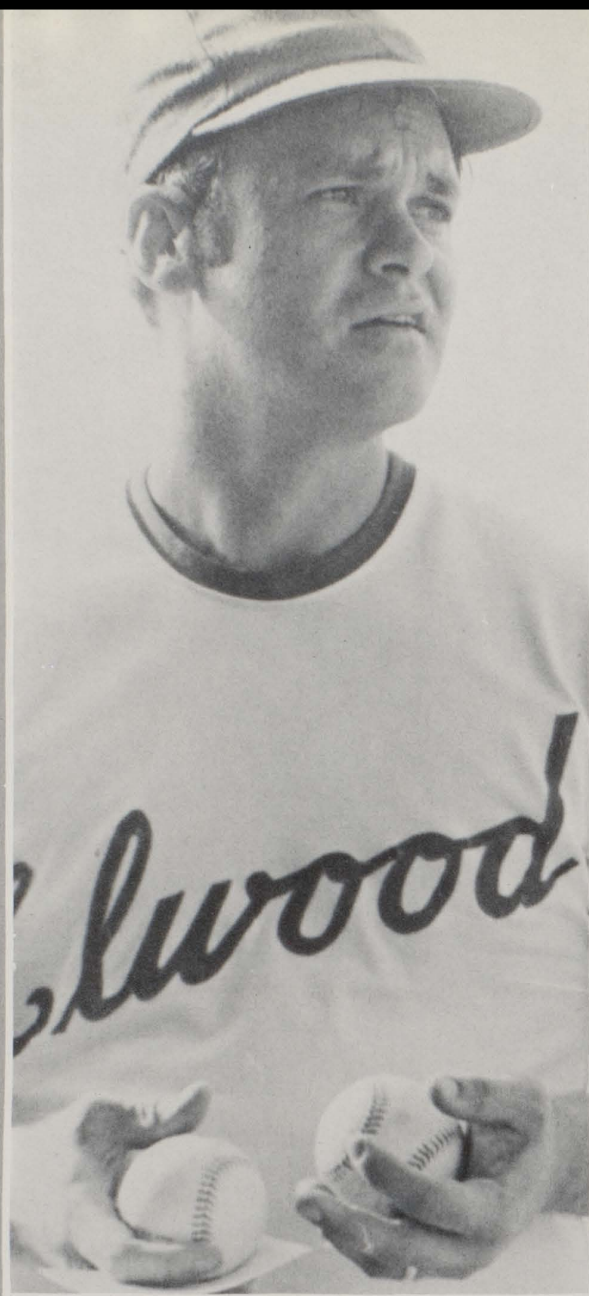

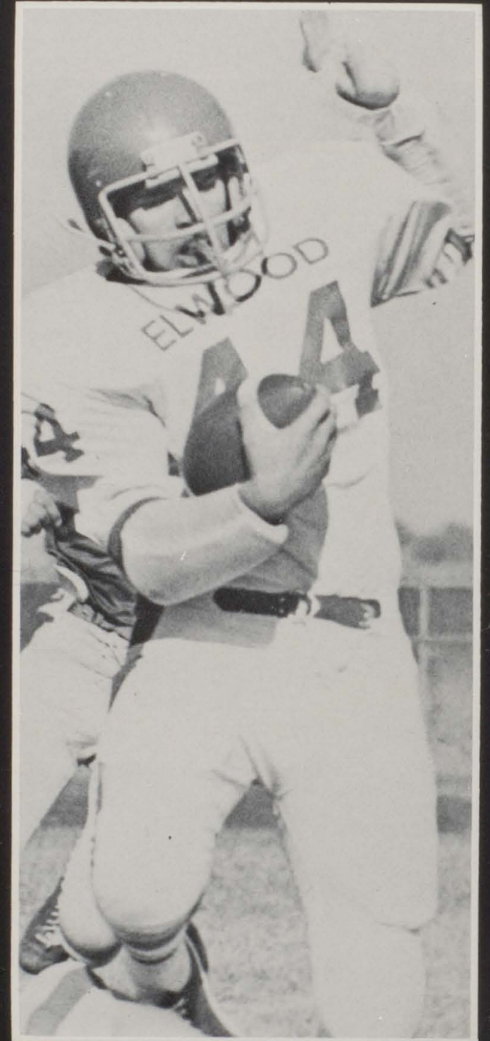

The float winners were as follows: first place to the sophomores; second to the seniors; third to the juniors; fourth to the freshmen; and fifth to the FBLA club.

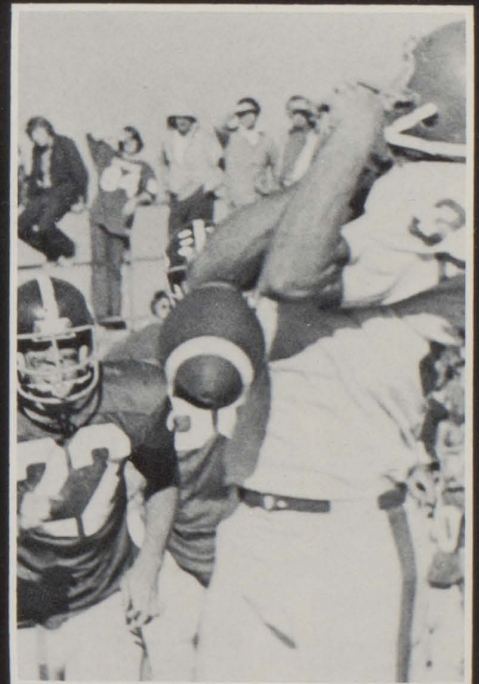

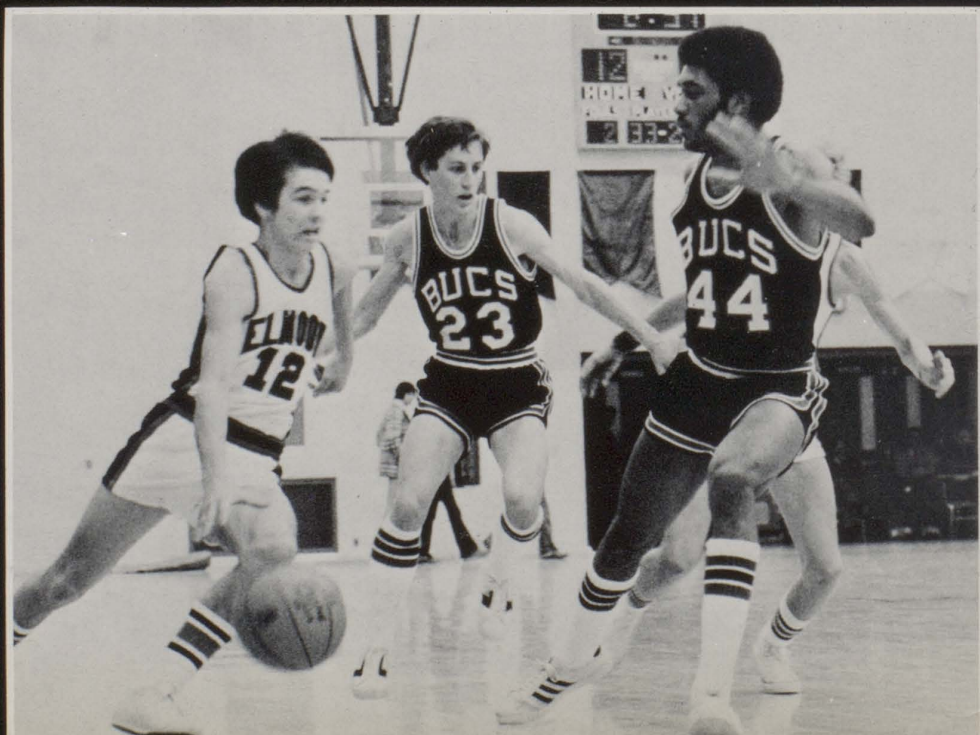

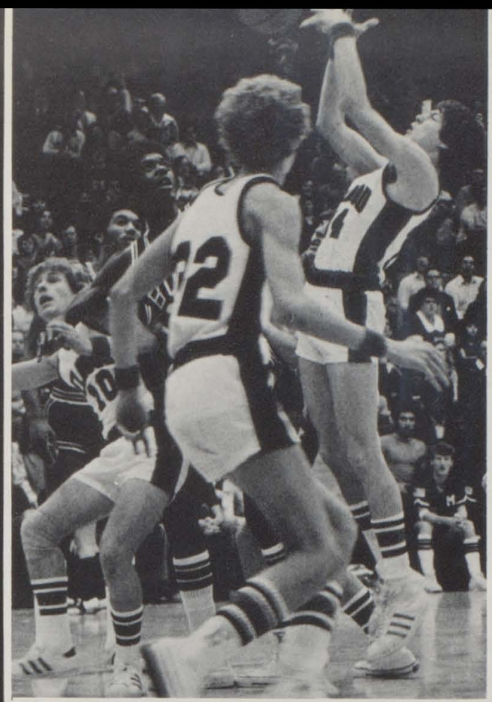
The Panthers closed out the season with a tough loss to Peru and a loss to number three ranked Anderson Highland.

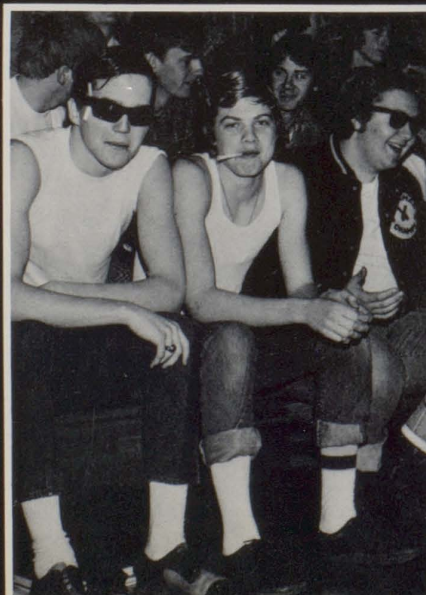

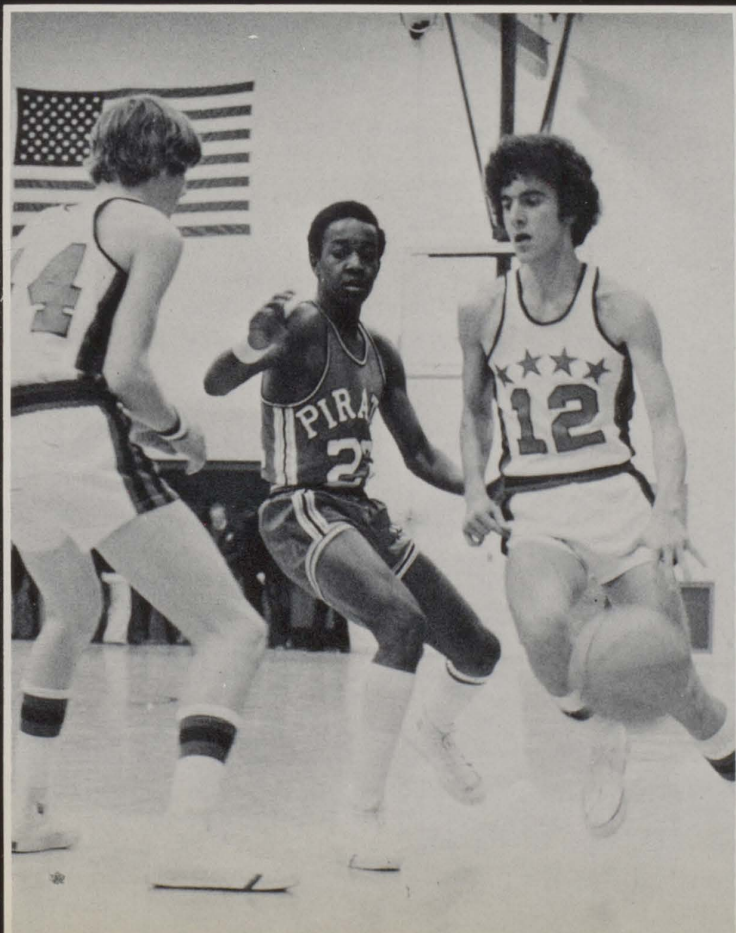

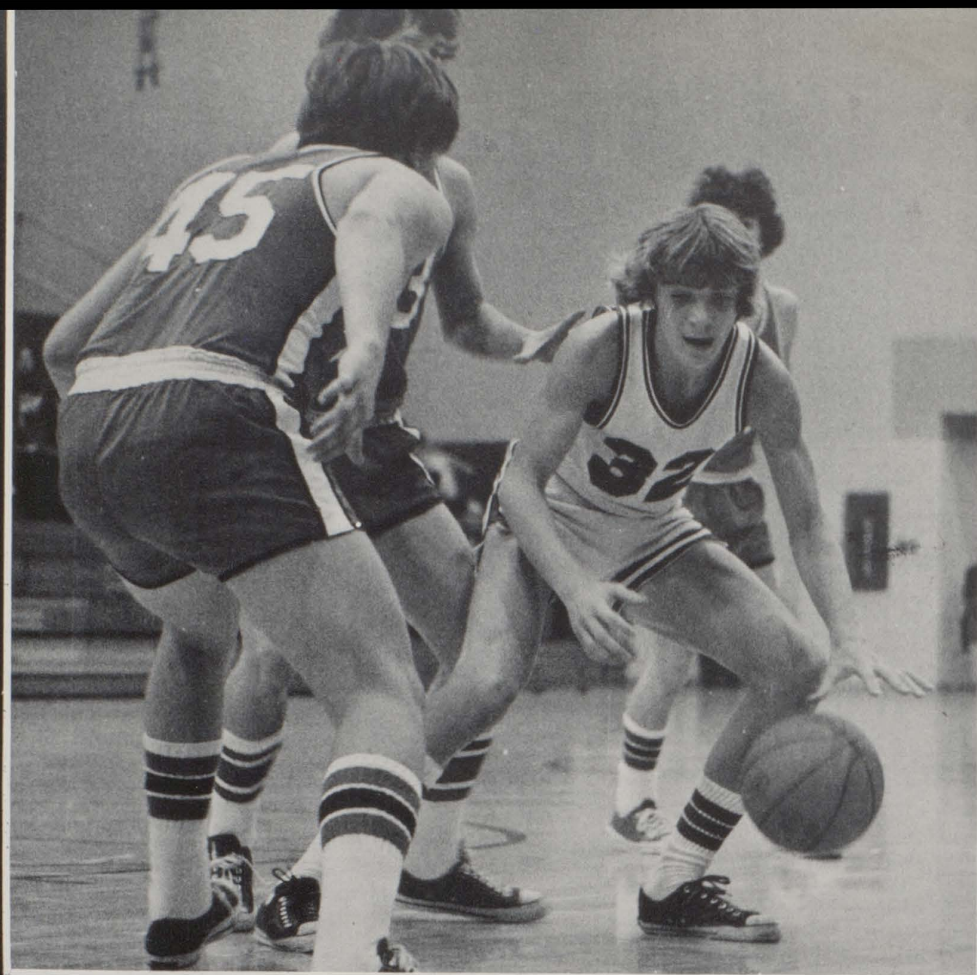

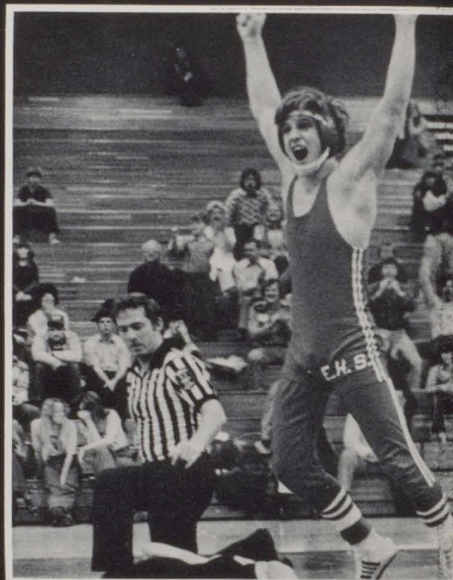
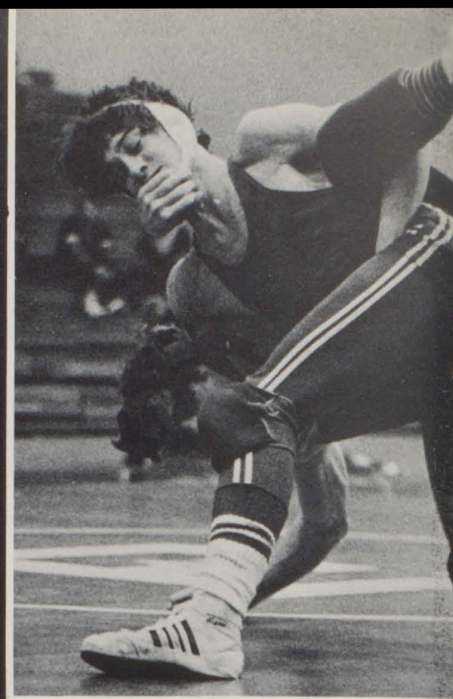
Wrestlers Top Season With C.I.C., 4th Place in State, Heavyweight State Champ

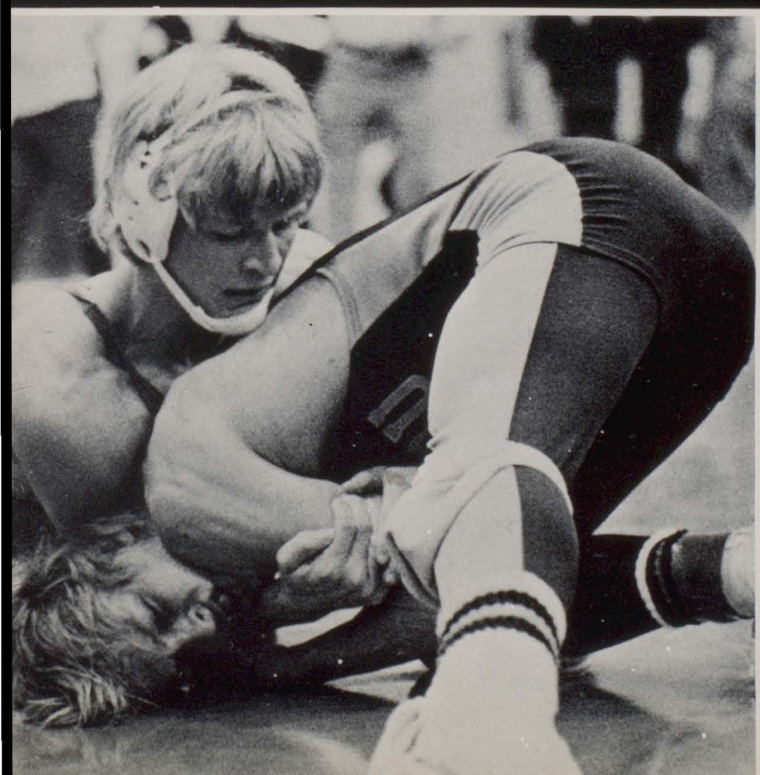

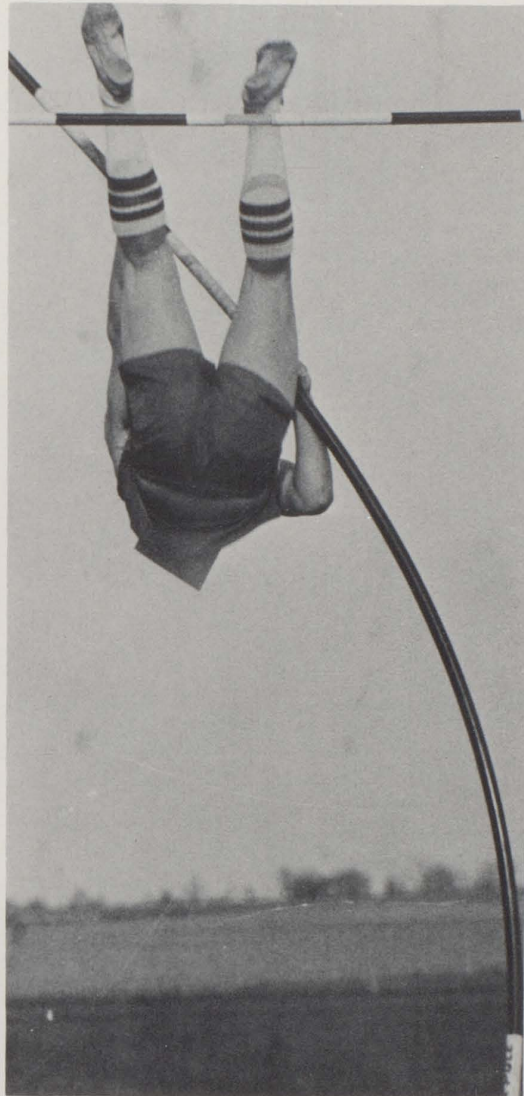
Panther trackmen also finished 6th in the Elwood relays, seventh in the CIC, and fifth in the Pendleton relays.

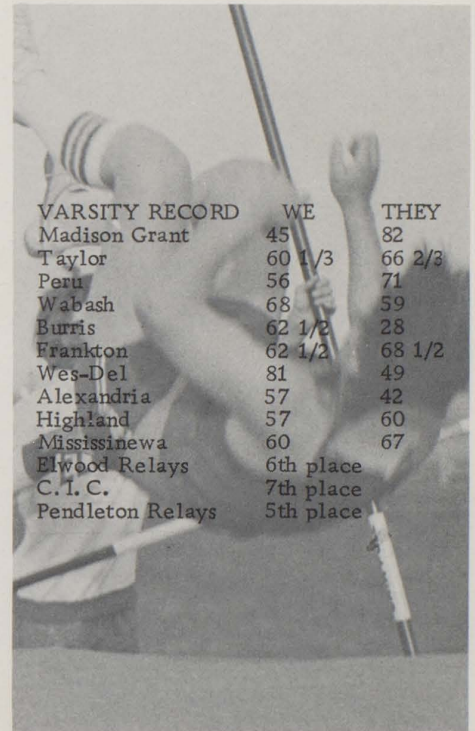

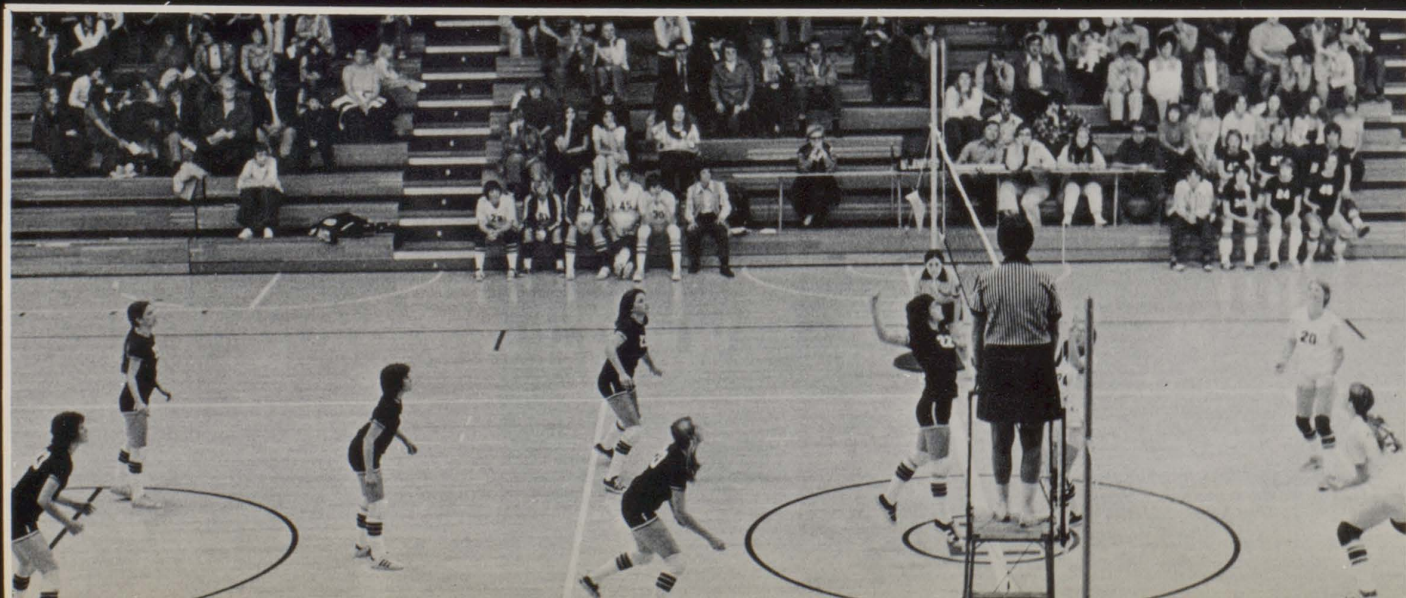

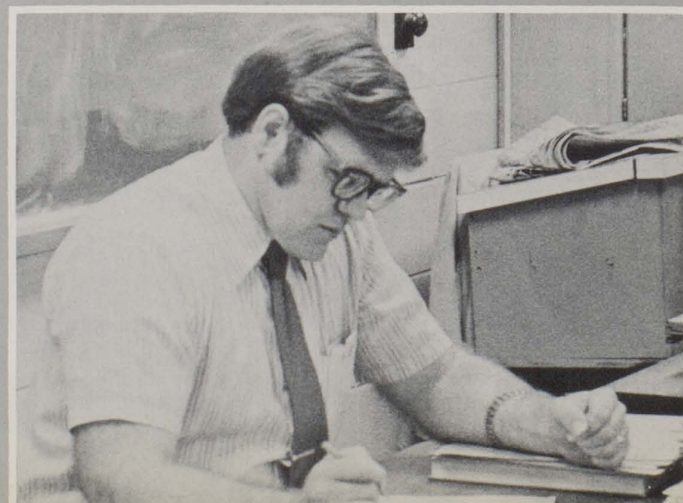

The prelude and the processional were played on the organ by Mr. Larry Goins, followed by the invocation and prayer with Reverend Kenneth Morgan presiding.

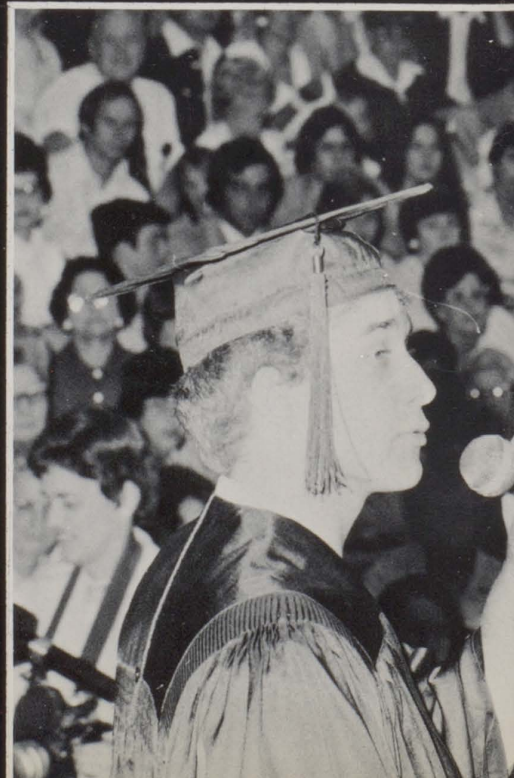
Reverend Joseph Wick of the Christian Church in Lafayette, Indiana,

Benediction by Rev. Morgan concluded the program after Mr. Goins played the recessional.

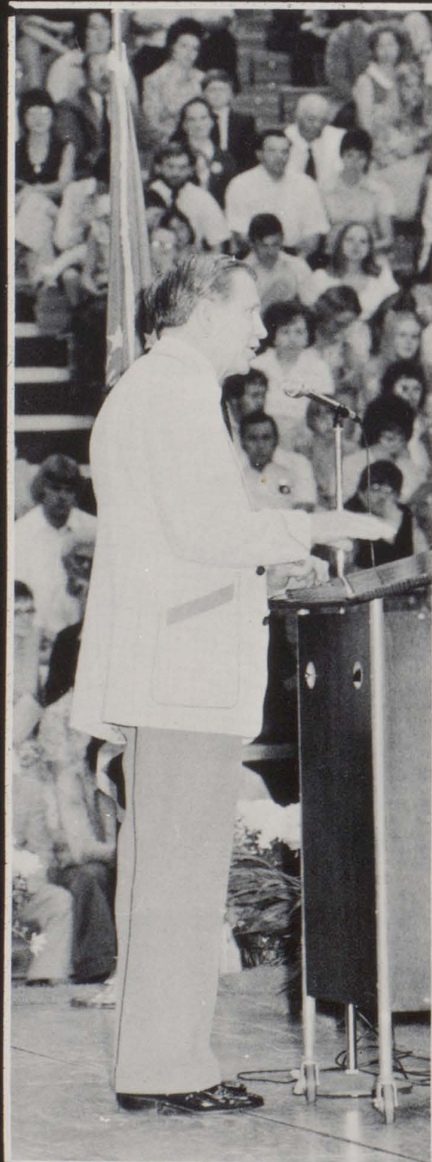

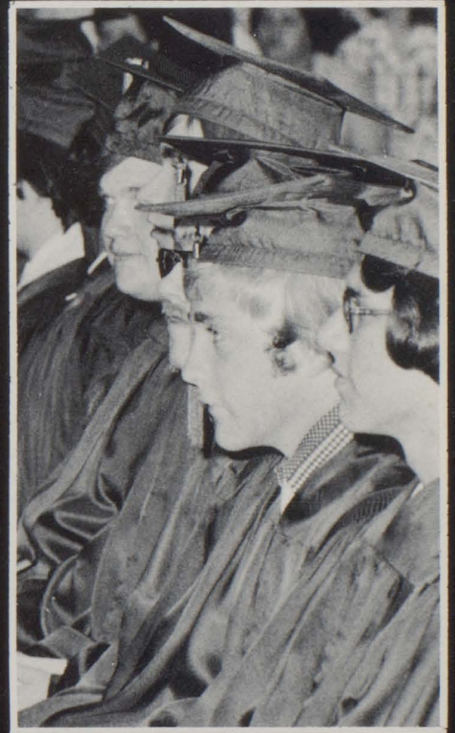

Well, look at me! I thought I'd never see the day when I was a senior, but here I am.

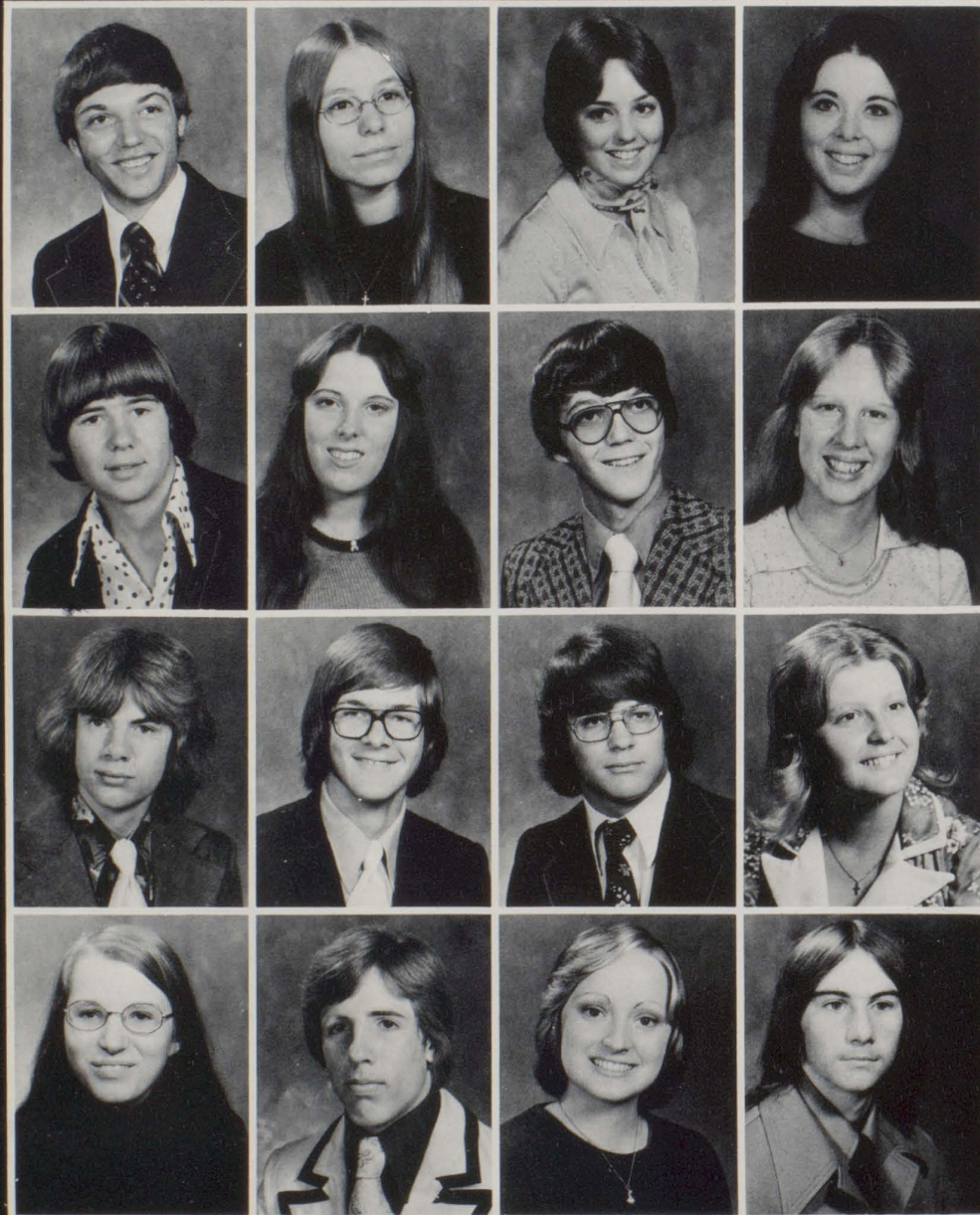

Time was short but we make it count. We laughed while the laughing was easy, and we cried to make it worthwhile.

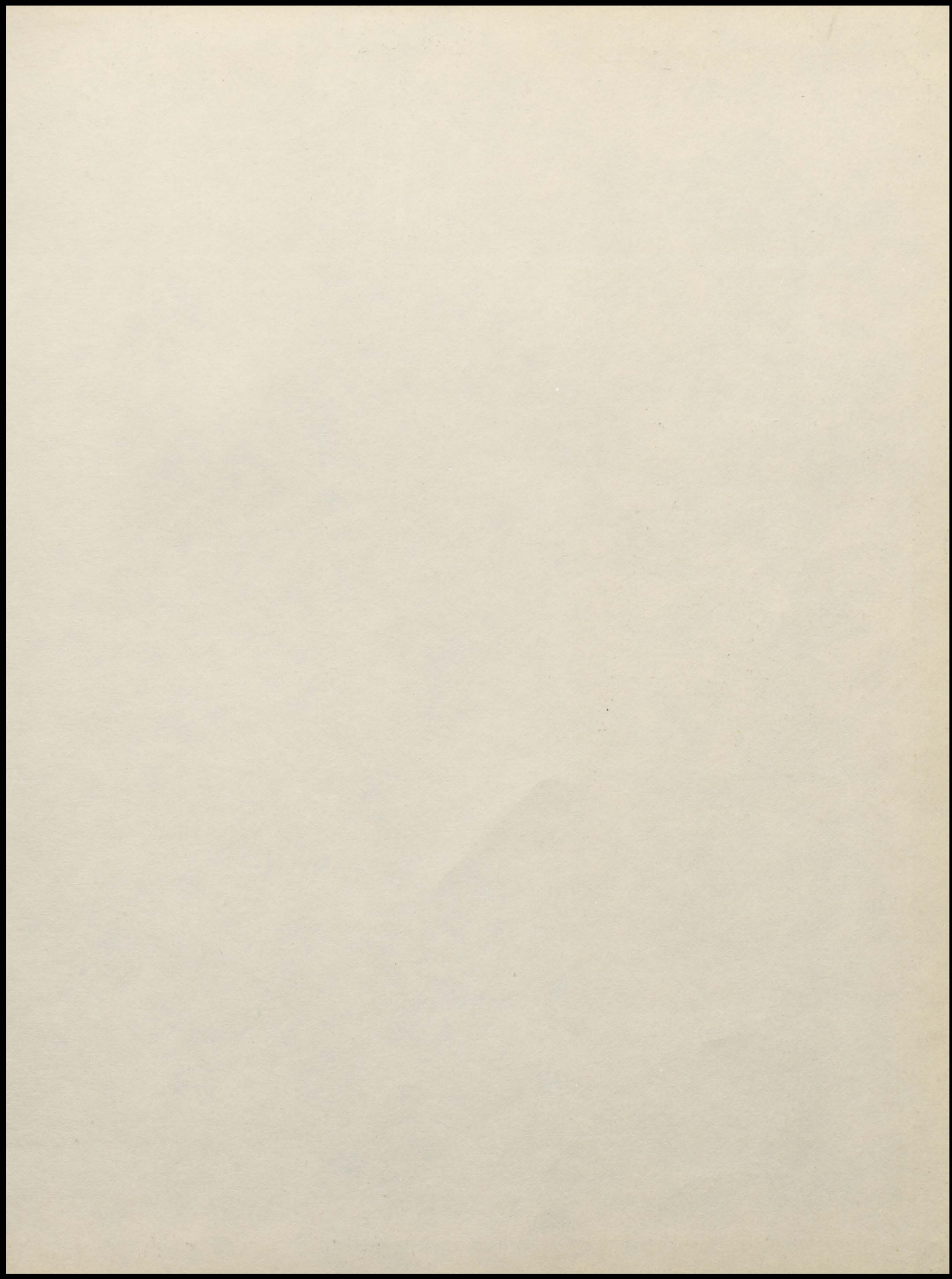

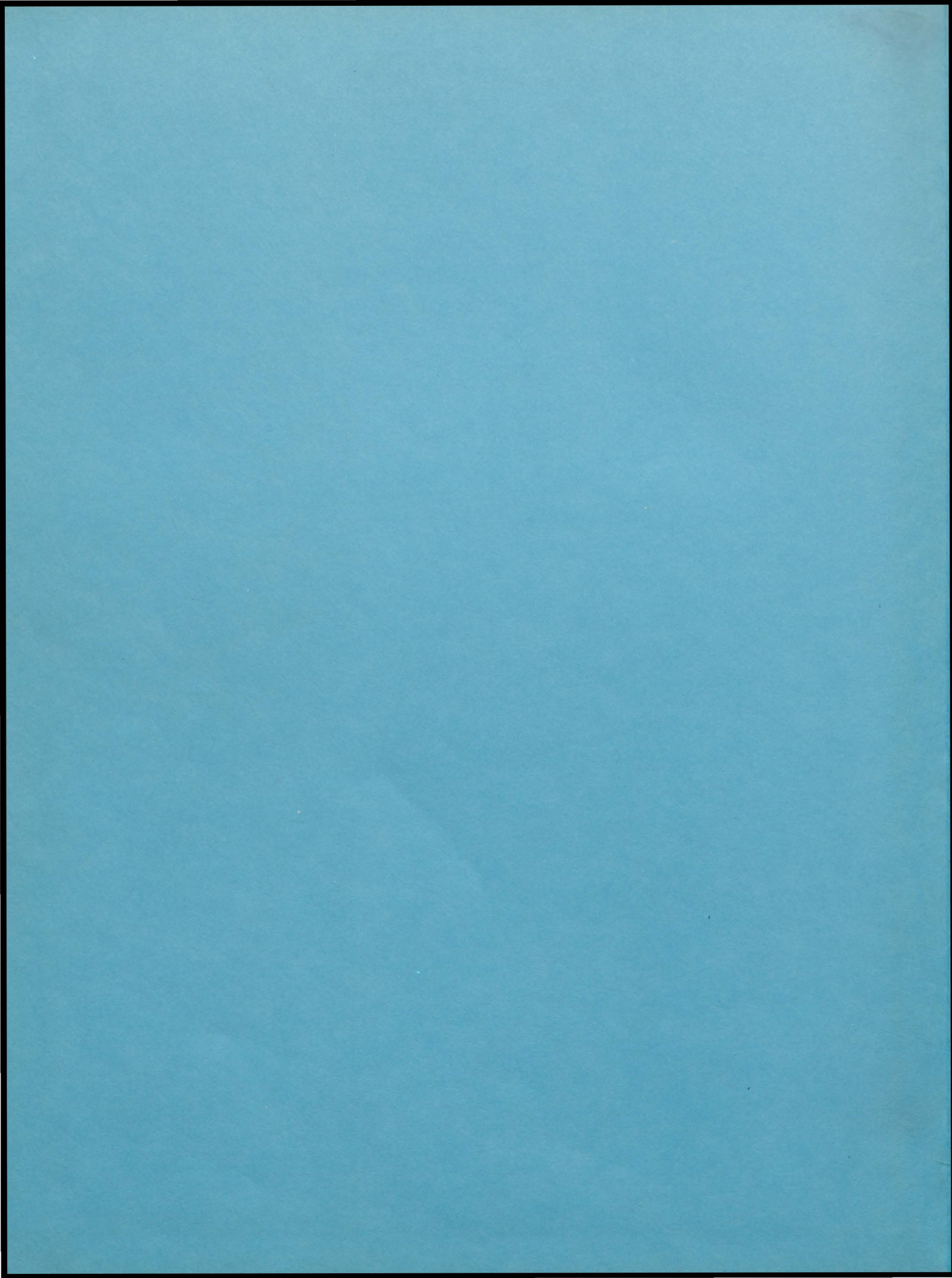
