Coming Together


The students of M-G come together for many various reasons. Whether it be to see their friends, just to have something to do, or to learn, as most parents believe it to be.






The hall decorations contest was won by the Seniors, and the banner contest was won by the sophomores.









Both Spanish and French second-year students had the opportunity to teach a foreign language in a local elementary school. They taught for 2-3 days out of the week during their regularly scheduled class. This lasted for six weeks. The students' aim was to get the children so interested in a foreign language that they would want to pursue the language further.

A new idea was implemented by the Spanish Department last year. A conversation group was started for honorary secondyear students. During their meetings, the members conversed in Spanish about current events. In first-year French students drew their dream houses and labeled the furniture. Later, speaking in French, they had to describe their house to the rest of the class.

In both Spanish and French classes, students were videotaped while they acted out a skit or interview. The students could speak only in the foreign language.

Many students feel that being able to speak a foreign language can be very useful. Some colleges require a knowledge of a foreign language. Although most students take a foreign language class because of these college requirements, many students discover that they enjoy the class.

open to all students at the high school.


Other math classes include Pre-Algebra I & II, Algebra I & II, geometry, trigonometry, pre-calculas, and analytic geometry.



AN APPLE for M-G

The Business Department purchased a new computer. The computer, an Apple IIE, has a word processor which enables it to edit copy, print out letters and reports, and type form letters. They also purchased new typewriters and calculators.

The Apple IIE was used last year by business machines and office practice students only. Eventually, though, the Apple IIE will be used in accounting classes and in beginning typing.

Students in office practice had the opportunity to be interviewed by area businessmen. Limited to seniors, the office practice class gave its students a chance to do actual secretarial work for members of the faculty.

Shorthand and typing classes have proved helpful not only to future secretaries but to college-bound students. General business classes introduce students to the complexity of money management. It provides the basis for the record keeping, accounting, business law, and business communication classes. Our business teachers hope that with up-to-date materials and equipment, M-G students will be able to keep up with current trends in the business world.

Cells, Classifications, Compositions

Science classes offered students a wide range of topics.

In bioligy, students studied basic cell structure and function and surveyed the plant and animal kingdoms. Most classes dissected an animal, either a frog or a fetal pig.

In advanced biology and zoology classes, an in-depth study of the animal kingdom was conducted. They advanced from phylum to phylum, starting with one-celled organisms and finishing with mammals. Their major dissection was a cat. This dissection lasted for two weeks.

Compositions of chemicals, molecule shapes, and simple formulas were just a little of what was covered in chemistry. In advanced chemistry, individual work was stressed. Students conducted experiments including blood analysis, redox reactions, and pharmacological studies of the effects of drugs on diseases. Advanced chemistry students also made soaps, dyes, alcohols, and acids.





The Ar Guys & Gals were just one of the school's organizations that brought high recognition to our high school.






Industrial arts classes gave students hands on experience in many areas of mechanics, electricity, light construction, and drafting. This experience gave many students the background they needed for future career choices.



A farmer has to figure rations of feed, how much fertilizer and weed killer to put down, how many head of cattle to sell, and etc. The list goes on and on. With all this bookwork to do, besides the actual physical labor, a farmer had to be a businessman and an economist. But, lately, there has been a breakthrough in farm management — the computer. A computer can facilitate the bookwork, and it can allow the farmer more time to do other things.


In the Ag economics class here at M-G, students learned how to manage a farm using a computer. They performed such duties as those listed above and found the computer did make it easier.

In introduction to Ag classes students covered the basics of farming. They used the computer to figure fertilizer amounts for different types of soil.

If a student wanted to carry his studies of agriculture further, he could take soils, crops, or livestock classes. These classes covered more indepth studies of soil types, the nutrients that crops need, and the care and management of livestock.

In welding class students covered the basics of welding. In farm mechanics class students tore down a gas and a diesel engine, and they they put them back together. They also painted a vehicle.

A CUPFUL








Senior Sentiments

Faculty sponsors for the freshman class were Mr. Hackney, Mrs. Kirby, and Mr. Terry Martin.



"I enjoy coaching because it's life itself. You must set goals and establish ways to reach these goals. It's a challenge!"








Volleyballers Play Well


Valuable Experience



Who lifts? Athletes. Usually the members of the football team, and the girls and boys track teams are the people you see working out. Strength is an asset for a good athlete.









The B-Team wrestlers showed a lot of potential this season. They finished with a record of 5-5, which almost matched that of the varsity. That was the best record in the history of the school.











Hoosier Boys' and Girls' State are held each June at Indiana State. Three boys and three girls are chosen by local sponsoring groups.




Food and Fun


