
Our theme demonstrates that if you get involved in your high school years, by tying all of the clubs, sports, academics, and other activities together, you will become a well rounded person.








A big purchase for the sophomores is a class jacket. The jacket has great symbolic value, showing the school's colors, the student's name, and the year the class graduates.









Teachers and administrators have a great part in providing a good education, but it is up to the students themselves to take advantage of the educational opportunities at Madison-Grant.











MATH

Vaious courses taught in the Home Economics department include Interpersonal Relations, Family Management, Handcrafts, Clothing, and Foods.




Social Studies


SPECIAL EDUCATION AND LEARNING DISABILITIES





HEALTH







PHYSICAL EDUCATION




CHORUS


YEARBOOK





This year's varsity team consists of three seniors, four juniors, and two sophomores.






Varsity Basketball

This is a young team with only two seniors, Matt Rosenthall and foreign exchange student Laurent Briffaz. One can expect great things from this young team in the coming years.














The second annual awards program was held on May 18. Many students were awarded scholarships and certificates for their achievements in various classes.
