





Latin is the basis of many modern languages. Under the instruction of Mrs.





In order to prepare its students for the business world, the curriculum of Wendell L. #### D.C.E. and N.Y.C. Students Have a Chance for






Extensive training is given to those students who participate in the excellent summer school physical education program.









The final contest against Huntington was forfeited due to excessive snow on the field and marked the end of high school football for 14 devoted seniors.


















