

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










### Students Earn Scholarship Jackets




The Thespian Society of FHS has been organized for 22 years. The club is sponsored by Mrs. Adeline Nall.

The Quaker baseball team had a record of 10-5, which was the best record of any athletic team this year.




Beck was named to the MIC first team. Davis and Hanlon were selected for the second team. Wilson received an honorable mention.







As in the past two years the team had to give up from ten to fifteen points each meet because all the weight classes weren't filled. The teams' record could have been better if these points hadn't been given away.





Pins, letters, wall plaques, and sweaters are some the awards given for a certain number of points obtained by the girls during the year.




# 33 Teams Participated in Bowling


