## Math

Mathematics is a course especially helpful for those students in technical fields. Engineering, accounting, or medicine careers require extensive knowledge in math areas. Mathematics is also important in everyday living. A good math background provides fundamental tools needed for tasks such as balancing a checkbook or determining the area of a room.

Included with the math department are computer classes. For only $\$ 895.00$ a 64 K Apple IIe terminal monitor and disk drive may be purchased. Presently, the computer room has several computers. Any person with expertise in handling a computer may use the terminals from 7:30 a.m. to $4: 30$ p.m. each school day. Various student aided learning software and math practice programs are available.

M-G students are required to take a minimum of two semesters of math. These semesters may be scheduled at any time during the high school years. There is no particular topic requirement, the choice is left to the student.

## Science

Students who take science classes have the opportunity to learn about the natural world. Topics range from chemistry to the dissection of different animals.

Science activities include making such items as plexiglass, rubber, ether and batteries. Demonstrations add excitement to class, especially when contact explosives are used. Hydrogen sulfide with that memorable rotten eggs smell is also frequently used.

Learning also takes place outside the classroom. Over Teacher's Institute, six seniors and Mr. and Mrs. Earnest went to the Great Smokey National Park. Students spotted five bears and hundreds of deer in the wild. The highlight of the trip was Cades Cove - a mountain valley of spectacular beauty.

## English

Students at Madison-Grant are required to take three and a half years of English. Students are exposed to topics such as grammar, composition, vocabulary, and literature.

This year the English Department selected new textbooks. The literature books provide a variety of poems, essays, plays, short stories, and novels. Supplementary material is also used. Freshmen may find themselves reading SOUNDER, or THE MIRACLE WORKER; sophomores BREAKING AWAY; juniors HUCK FINN; and seniors OTHELLO or AND THEN THERE WERE NONE. Many of these works have been recorded on video tape. Mrs. Hull comments that it is important to visualize a work as long as video use is tempered with discretion.

In addition to literature, the basic parts of speech and fundamental composition skills are presented. Principal Martin visited Mrs. Dosh's freshman English class and taught students how to write business letters. In academic junior Eng. lish, students practiced writing their own epitaphs.

## History

The history department of Madison-Grant has a wide range of classes one can take to broaden his knowledge. Students learn information from the pilgrims to the ways of present day life.

There are many different classes a student may take such as economics, government, introduction to social studies, early civilization, world conflicts, geography, psychology, sociology, and U.S. history.

The seniors of the government class learned how the government is run and learned how to fill out tax forms.

The introductions to social studies class learned first-hand how the court system works. Students acted out a court scene with each student playing a part.
U.S. history students were taught our U.S. heritage. Students had the chance to study the events of the past that have helped to shape what the U.S. is today. These pupils also had chances to use their new knowledge during debates, review games, skits, trials, monopoly-type games, and many more fun, educational classroom activities.

## Foreign Language

The foreign langauge department offered students a choice of studying either the French or the Spanish language. During these classes, students also learned the different traditions and the cultures of the country

Any student planning to attend college is encouraged to take a foreign language class. Many colleges today require students to have a foreign language background.

## Health

Health class, a one semester course, was required of sophomore students at M-G. Health students learned more about the physical and emotional development of human beings, positive self-concept, clarifying personal values, drinking, smoking, boy-girl relationships, drug use, and first aid techniques. Students watched a variety of informative movies. Students participated in discussions concerning different ways to deal with the pressures of stress.

Madison-Grant students are required to take two semesters of physical education. In these classes students gain experience in a variety of activities. Basketball, track, tennis, baseball, gymnastics, golf, kickball, co-ed square dancing, and volleyball games are some of the activities. While participating in these activities, students learn the strategies of the game and also benefit from the physical effort. ## Home Economics

The home economics department here at Madison-Grant offered a wide variety of classes. Some of the classes available were foods, clothing, marriage and family, child development, housing, consumer education, interpersonal rela tions, and family management.

During clothing classes students studied body shapes and designed sewing patterns. They then constructed garments.

In foods classes, students studied the daily nutritional requirements and prepared food. In more advanced classes, students studied customs and prepared the foods of other countries.

While in either marriage and family, child development, housing, consumer education, interpersonal relations, or family management, students learned how to manage a budget and a family. Students also learned the many responsibilities involved in a family relationship.

## Agriculture

The M-G agriculture department taught the importance of the farming industry. Since both Madison and Grant counties are basically farming communities, these classes were of great value to many students. Some of the classes offered to students were Agribusiness I (introduction to agriculture), soil science, crops production, agriculture construction and maintenance, animal production (livestock), farm business management (agriculture economics), and farm mechanics. The skills which students learned in these classes will help those who plan to be actual farmers. Even if one was not interested in farming, these classes were beneficial. Students learned to keep records, how to manage money, equip. ment, and much more.
Agriculture students received hands-on experience, not only in the fields and barns, but on the three Radio Shack TRS-80 model 4 microcomputers. The agriculture is the department here at Madison-Grant which offered computer training for freshmen students. Also, any student who takes an agriculture class can be in Future Farmers of America.

## Industrial Arts

The industrial arts department teaches students fundamental skills, terminology, safety procedures, tools, and materials used inthe industrial arts area. Beginning students in the introductory classes gained knowledge in different areas such as drafting, electricity, woods, welding, metals, and power. Advanced students made major projects, with the emphasis being placed on quality and workmanship. The advanced welding and woods students built a project of their own choosing and design. Their project was to be one which used all or most of the skills learned in their previous classes. Students benefited greatly from the hands-on experience which they received from their industrial arts classes.

The art department attempted to expose students to an artistic point of view. Students learned to detect the many different colors, textures, shapes, and shades that are overlooked by the untrained eye. Students tried not to be satisfied with a job done the first time. A student learned that it may take many tries and a lot of practicing before he reached a finished product. Students strove to be more critical of their own work. From the many hours of practicing students found that their hand and eye coordination improved greatly and that their designs and methods improved. Students also developed their own individual techniques. These techniques sometimes varied as much as signatures. Some of the projects included ceramics, painting, sculptures, and drawing.

## Business

The business department helps students learn to improve economic citizenship. Students had a variety of classes to choose from. Courses included general business, typing, shorthand, office practice, business machines, sales, recordkeeping, business law, business communications, and accounting.

Almost every career has some aspect of business to it; the mother and housewife has to manage the family budget; the farmer must buy and sell his products; an artist must buy his supplies and sell his work.

Students who take business classes learn to organize and run a business, keep records, and obtain supplies.

Business skills are also helpful for other classes. Typing alone is used considerably. In English classes term papers must be typed. Some speeches for speech class must be typed. Reports or projects for various other classes must be typed before handed in for a final grade.

## Vocational School

Vocational school laboratory programs were available to most junior and senior students, as well as post-graduates. Vocational Education strived to provide training for the development of students' skills for a career. Students who attended these classes, either at Elwood or Marion, received three credits per semester. Other than books and laboratory fees, and travel expenses, there was no other cost to students. A student's tuition was paid for by the school in which they were attending. Vocational school offered classes in the automotive, machine, mechanics, building, office, food service, health, printing, electronics, and welding fields. Anyone interested in any kind of vocational school training should see his counselor for information.

Approximately $20 \%$ of the juniors and seniors here at M-G attend vocational school. There are two such schools in the M-G area. The Tucker Area Vocational Technical Center is located in Marion. The John H. Hinds Area Vocational School is in Elwood. The courses offered vary from auto mechanics to marketing.

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## Under Construction

The building of the new junior high is now underway.

The cost of the junior high building, Park elementary classroom additions, high school roof, elevator, and auditorium is estimated at 6.6 million dollars.
