
Fall Festival

STUDENT COUNCIL

As the result of student demand and through the encouragement and guidance of Mr. Roland DuBois, principal, the Student Council was revived last fall as an active group in the life of the school. Starting off with a vigorous campaign for the election of a president, the organization membership culminated in class meetings and elections following auditorium speeches by president candidates and their supporters. Backed by David Nall, Thurman Harter won on the platform, "Fun, Freedom, and Fair Play for Fairmount High." Harter's only opponent was James Spahr, whose campaign manager was John Mitchener.

While the Student Council's progress has not been phenominal it has been steady. Exercising governing powers over the student body in areas where the school administration is ineffective as well as those areas wherein the administration works hand in hand with the student body, the Student Council was able to promote the general school welfare effectively. One example of their

successful efforts was the formulating of some definite rules concerning the cafeteria line. The council suggested that the line be formed by class segments, with a different class having the privilege of being first on succeeding days. Controlling behavior in the line also fell under their jurisdiction.

HONOR SOCIETY

STUDENT LIBRARIANS


"Where can I find something about plastics?"

Traditional robes of maroon with white collars were worn by the girls when they sang for special programs and church appearances. their activities for the year were an appear-




G. A. A.



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


Sparked by the fleet-footed ability of Thurman Harter, the Quaker harriers ran to victory many times this year. Almost daily last fall these boys






