State requirements for driver education are that a student must have had six hours behind the wheel and seventy-two hours' classwork.

Driving skills, which are practiced, are first, getting ready to drive, and then the basic skills. These are preparing to move the car; starting and stopping; steering; turns; city driving; country driving; highway driving; and learning to parallel park.

This past winter some of the students were able to experience driving in the bad weather on snow and ice.

The area automobile dealers provided the students with new and safe machines to learn to drive correctly and with care.

The Vocational Auto Mechanics program at Mid-Central-Area Vocational School is a twoyear program for junior, senior and postsecondary students. Vocational Machine Shop is a two-year program organized to progressively develop the skills and knowledge required for a successful career in the machine-tool industry. It is designed to prepare students who intend to pursue such a career.

Pre-employment Vocational Education is basically a cooperative program between participating industries and the P.V.E. class of Mid-Central Area Vocational School.

The class members receive machining, fabricating, and assembly work experience using the materials furnished. Some machinery is furnished by the industrial concern when special machinery is required or when additional machinery for a specific job is needed. For the most part, machinery is furnished by Mid-Central Vocational and adapted to the job requirement.

In addition to learning manipulative skills, all levels of management functions and procedures are presented and discussed in classroom situations. Union organization and representation is also presented and discussed. These factors of manufacturing enlighten the students on responsibilities, expectations, and requirements of both the employer and employee. It is hoped that student habit formation and growth will then be directed toward development of responsible employees.

The P.V.E. class has a 100 per cent V.I.C.A. membership and officers are elected each semester.
