## Interesting Techniques of Teaching

In past years the foreign languages were taught differently than they are today. Before, the language was only read and then briefly studied, and a thorough understanding was not achieved.

Since then, new techniques have been introduced to the teaching departments. One of the new techniques presently being used at Willkie is the Audio-Lingual lab. This involves an eight-station tape recorder, used in order that a number of students could learn at the same time. Other teaching facilities included film
strips, records, and individual tape recorders which were used so that students could record and hear themselves speak the language.

The goals of the foreign languages were to learn and better understand the country, customs, and cultures, and to appreciate the literature of the particular country studied.

After this was accomplished, the students could better understand their own language.

The industrial arts classes include drafting, welding, woods, machine shop, and home mechanics and repairs. These are geared toward skill areas, and teach the fundamentals necessary for entering

## and Experience for Future Employment

Good vocational courses utilize methods involving hearing, seeing, and performing the skills of an occupation correctly under close supervision.

The V.B. T. program gives students an opportunity to learn skills in many of the construction trades, such as carpentry, masonry, plumbing, and plastering, along with other special trades. Most of the students who go through the building trades program enter into one of the construction trades or a related occupation.

To give the student practical experience in the electronics trade is the main
purpose of the Vocational Electronics course.

Trouble-shooting procedures and the use of test equipment are stressed. The students build, test, and maintain many types of electronic circuits, including amplifiers, radios, and televisions.

The Vocational Electronics course is taught by Mr. Hawkins. This year, many new pieces of equipment were added to fulfill better the need of each student.

Industrial Cooperative Training class paved the way for careers for many Willkie students. Data Processing was offered for the first time this year. Whether gainfully employed in the field, looking toward similar employment, or simply as a part of the world so vitally influenced by it, a basic understanding of Data Processing is essential for effective communication.

Mrs. Kintzel, instructor, taught the threehour course to high school students and post graduates. Students received training in the operation of all unit-record equipment, and in computer languages. The difference between V.C.T. and V.S.T. is that shorthand is not required. The class is actually designed as an office. When students enter the classroom, they punch a time clock, and at the end of the week they receive paychecks with deductions. Every two weeks, these students rotate positions, such as office manager in charge of the laboratory, assistant office manager in charge of production of letters, supply clerk who takes care of supplies forclass and makes the inventory, and receptionist-secretary who greets visitors to the class and types personal material for the instructor.

These students meet three hours per day, and participate many times at work stations. They are also members of O.E.A., which is a co-curricular club. The class sold poly-foot animals, and had a car wash as their money-making projects. This money was used for field trips to Bell Telephone and Guide Lamp in Anderson, entrance fees for state contests and a banquet at the end of the year.
