


There are also students who go to the library.



"I'm unique because I have a big ugly scar on my knee, and it has two big holes on the side," said junior Amber Bailey.


"I'm unique just because I'm myself," said sophomore Casey Blanton.

In the second quarter, the Panthers tied the score 7-7. The Argylls took a 14-7 lead when senior Dallas Coleman made a touchdown and Josh Tobey made the field goal. At the end of the second quarter the score was 17-7, the last three points made by a field goal from Tobey.

During half-time, the King and Queen for the senior class were announced. The King, Aaron Eden, led the Queen, Cara Hussey into a convertible to drive away just as the rain arrived. Because of the dangerous lightning, ear-piercing thunder, and driving rain, the game was delayed for thirty-five minutes.









"I put pictures of my friends in my locker," commented junior Amber Bailey. Students also use things to personalize their agendas.


"I like to draw on my agenda," said sophomore Charlene Mockobee.























Athletics once again played an important role at Madison-Grant.




















The Lady Argylls also had to face the new system of class basketball.


"I think sectional was tough," said senior Amanda Dunlap. "I don't know that I really like the class system."




"Every team is different. I'm sure this age group will have some success in the future," coach Strasemeier added.





After losing four competitive seniors and only one returning senior, the girls track team had many events to be filled.
























