We entered Fairmount High School August 28, 1945 as green freshmen. After our initiation September 12 we were freshmen, but no longer green. March 13 was the date for the freshman plays. Soon after freshmen flag day, March 20, school was out and our first year of high school was completed.

Our sophomore year opened with many successes. The first school sponsored party, a wiener roast, was held at the school in October. Our pride swelled with the arrival of our gold and white sweaters the following March. Our sophomore plays completed the activities of a school year we will not forget.

As juniors we were kept quite busy with extracurricular activities. Our first party featured a hay-ride and potluck supper. Our class rings arrived January 16. We held another potluck supper in the cafeteria during the school semester, and were entertained later with square dances which Mr. Coffee called for us. To raise money for the junior-senior reception, we sponsored a Christmas dance, a Skru-ball game, and the Dixie Four in March. May 14 the junior-senior reception was
held at the Hotel La Fontaine in Huntington. This is one of our most outstanding school memories.

We opened our senior year by selecting class officers September 15, 1948. We also voted to take a trip at the end of the year. Our first money making project of the year was the selling of class pins. Virginia Payne, senior candidate for Carnival queen, was selected to reign over the Hallowe'en carnival. We also had a booth at the carnival to sell doughnuts and cider.

In November we had our pictures taken for the annual. In December a Christmas party was held in the Home Ec. room.

Penny suppers, magazine subscription sales, holding dinners at farm sales, and a Skru-ball game were among the projects we undertook to raise money during the school semester for our trip to Washington, D. C. April 6 and 7 we presented our senior play, "You Can't Take It With You."

May 7 we started on our trip to Washington, D. C. and returned May 13. May 15 we donned our grey caps and gowns for the first time. May 16 we were graduated, and our school life was ended but we will always remember our times at Fairmount High School.
