The annual art show was held on Friday, May 22 in the auditorium lobby with tours offered throughout the day of the newly landscaped courtyard.

$\mathbf{M}$ iss Kronk, who is the head of the art department, received an American Education Grant which gave the art department an opportunity to develop and implement creative educational projects that enhance the learning experiences of students. It provided Miss Kronk a resource to expand and enhance the curriculum for the students in her art classes. The grant provided money to purchase flower bulbs, shrubs, stepping stones, planting soil, mulch, a small pond, and wood. Nails, paint, and clay were also purchased for the creation of sculptures. The Boy Scouts, led by Nathan Hartman, constructed a flower bed and benches for the courtyard. They also cleaned the area and did some general groundskeeping in order to prepare the area. : The gifted and talented, the three-dimensional, and the painting art classes worked on specific assignments for the courtyard. Several clay and wood sculptures were made including fish placed on dowel rods, individually designed tiles, and clay flowers and butter-
flies. Miss Kronk anticipated that the outcome of the courtyard would increase student interest in artistic expression, increase self-esteem and confidence, increase pride in individual and group accomplishments, and increase student cooperation, leadership, and responsibility. The project will be evaluated by articles in the newspaper, a springtime art show showcasing the courtyard, and comments from the school, community and students on the success of the project. Before and after photos of the area were taken with all the changes that occurred throughout the project. The only disappointments throughout the whole construction was the rainy weather, which prohibited any outdoor activity, and the sculptures that did not survive the kiln. The courtyard, which has not been utilized for several years, will now be used during contact periods for the expression of artistic talent including dance, poetry readings, music, singing, and any other form of art.
