

To top off the sensational week, Zeus and Roadmaster entertained students at the victory dance after the game.
















Fads and Fashions



American artist Norman Rockwell died at the age of 84. He painted more than 300 covers for the Saturday Evening Post.







Skits, songs, jokes and just plain fun were the materials that made up the first talent show at MGHS.


This show, sponsored by Concert Choir, included any students who had a talent that they wished to share with other people.


Freshmen with high grades in science could take Biology this year. Those not having the high grades took the introductory courses to biology, chemistry, physics, and environment.




Jim Ratliff shows his ISB class the relationship between liquids of different densities.







More than just counting












Special Education gets new teacher














Band plays its way up







The members also had several parties as social events throughout the year.





During the second semester, each teacher had to make a list of fifty words relating to the subject they taught.



Strumming his guitar and singing along is Mark Gluff. Mark has been singing for five years and accompanying himself on the guitar for three years.






Karen Garner, junior, reaches for her last bit of strength to finish the race at an M-G track meet.




Girls make it four in a row











Next year's team will have five returning letter winners under new coach Debb Hackney.


















Boys capture county crown








Ross Reeves led the team in scoring, rebounding, and field goal percentage, while Todd Stroup made 79 assists which was 56 more than anyone else on the team.











Once again the halls of M-G will be hushed by the effects that summer vacation brings.
