We, the Senior Class of '34", appreciate his unceasing efforts to maintain the high standard of the school from which we are being graduated this year.

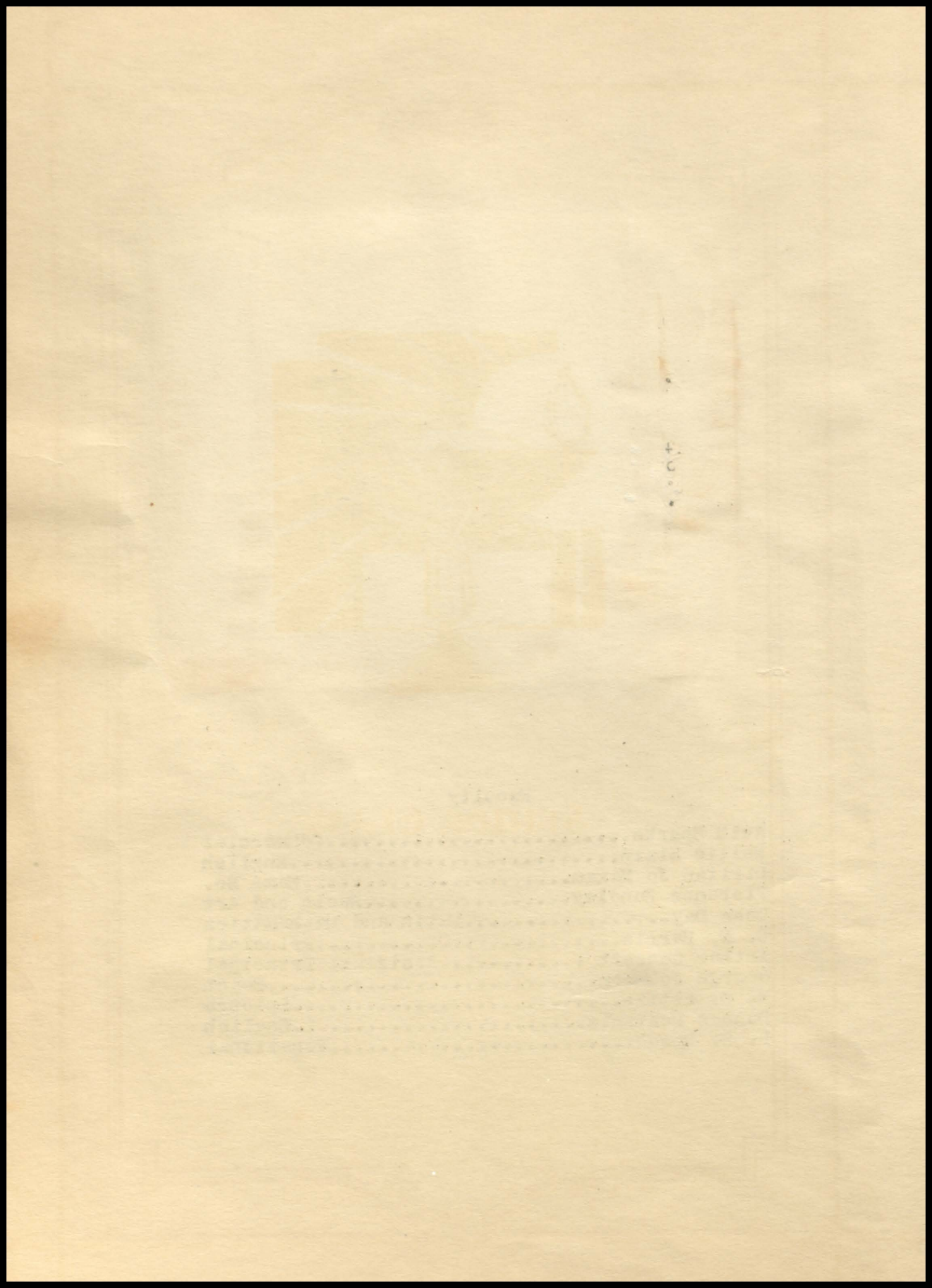

SENIOR CLASS

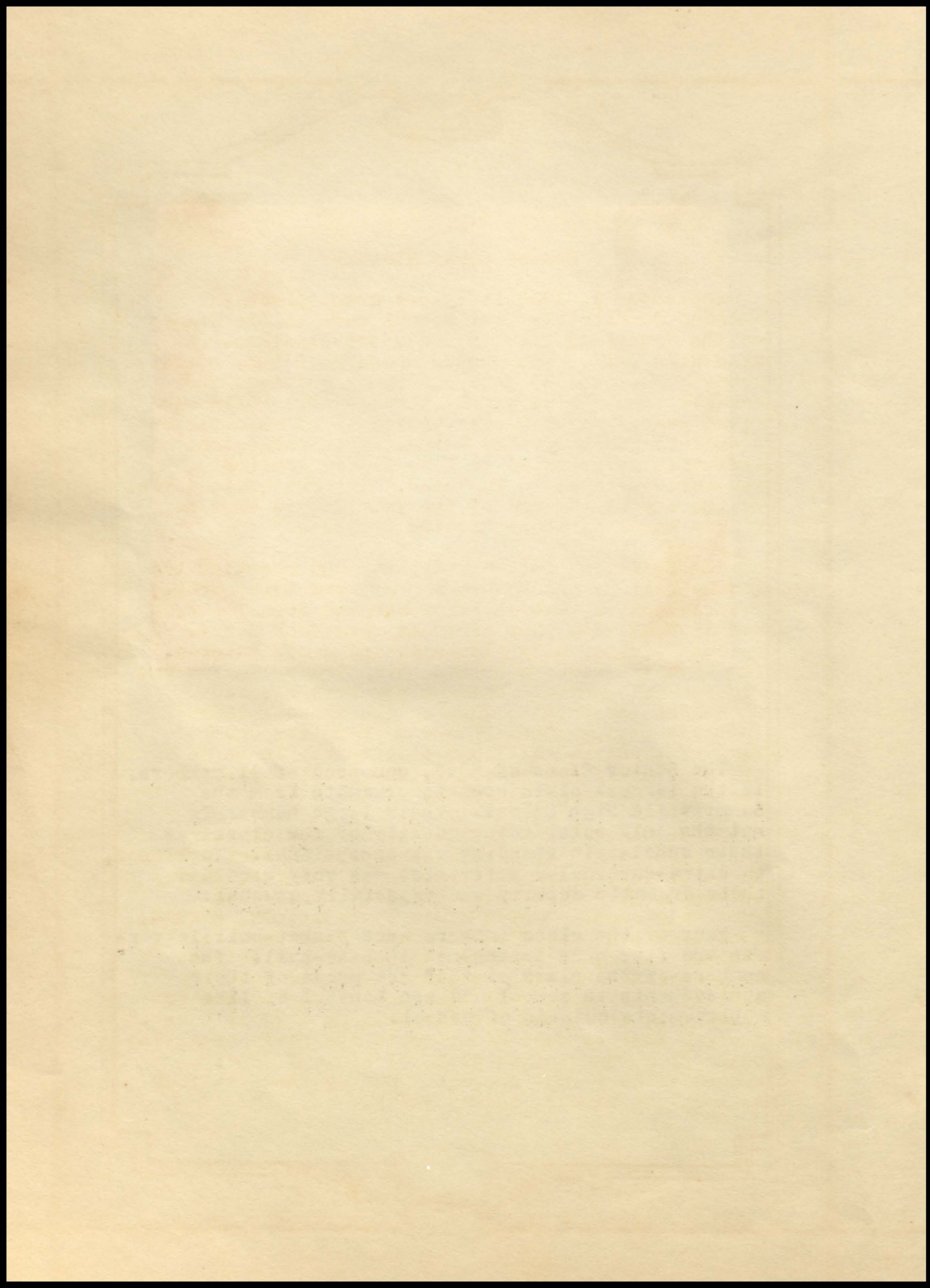

Senior Class History

September 1, 1930 fifty-one green freshies entered Summitville High School much to the dismay of the dignified faculty and upper-classmen. Miss Rita Trader was chosen sponsor of this spirited young group, and by her good humor and tact she managed to steer us safely through that well-noted first year. Wayne Brewer proved to be an efficient president for his fifty enthusiastic followers. At Christmas we regreted to lose Howard Tomlinson, who left us to go to Converse. We were quite joyful at the end of the end of the year for we were no longer known as those "little freshies."
