




Between practices, work,






Scott Arehart, Chad Hibst, and Clay Creekmore hustle ino the locker room for a halftime discussion.

After scoring a touchdown, Marty Blake, Laura Fortner, Amy Titley, and Tom Cannon celebrate by playing the school song.



A "fairy tale victory" will be the way many Elwoodites remember the 1992 Elwood vs. Tipton football match-up at the Hoosier Dome. The Elwood Panthers, led by senior tailback John Wilson, stunned the Blue Devils with a 34-21 romp. Not only did Elwood's offense produce 277 yards rushing and 37 yards passing, the powerful defense limited Tipton to only 38 yards rushing, completely stopping T.H.S.'s most effective backs.

The outstanding preformance was noticed and greatly appreciated by many spectators in attendance. Although every team in the C.I.C. division competed that day, Elwood sold the most pre-game tickets, an indication of the loyal supporters of Panther football. The crowd, encouraged by E.H.S. cheerleaders, demonstrated great spirit during the game. The Panther band performed during halftime and added much enthusiasm throughout the contest with various drum chants.

When asked what the success of the day was due to, Coach **Tony Boley** responded, "The success of the day was attributed to the desire, discipline, and determination of the players and coaching staff to work all winter and summer long in the weight room. We had


great practices every day and were mentally prepared."



There are many new accessories used this year such as trouser socks, suede belts with large buckles, large earrings, hoop earrings with charms, and big, silk hairbows.












Scott Arehart, Chad Bozell, and Geoff Cook wait patiently for the start of the graduation ceremony.






Fourty - four percent of all Elwood Community High School students are involved in vocational educational activities.

Of all the students at Elwood Community High School 13% maintain a general path of study.








This Roman home was put together by first year Latin student Stephanie Bailey as a semester exam for Latin class. All first year students were assigned to construct a Roman home.














The National Honor Society, under the direction of Raeanna Merritt and Joan Mercer, experienced a busy and successful year.

S pecial Projects

Elwood Community High School offers students a wide variety of academic classes. In many of these classes special projects are a part of the curriculum. One class which offers a great selection of projects is economics. This class, instructed by Mr. Michael Bomholt, creates a business for the students. This year's first semester class created the group S.H.A.R.E., Students Helping America Rebuild Economically. They produced and distributed notebooks of recycled paper along with raising money for Hurricane Andrew victims. The second semester class named its company E.P.I.C. 



to take. Alex's hobbies are playing golf, drama, and working as class president in Germany.















School records for wrestling were set by Mike Robison who had 84 takedowns, 24 near fall - 3 pt. and 13 near fall - 2 pt.






tradition at E.C.H.S," according to Coach Brian Kirkwood.









Mr. Phil Brown and Mr. Don Plake






The 1992-93 school year was the first year for the Peer Helpers with Donna Lockhart and Janet Trowbridge as the sponsors of the organization. To become a Peer Helper, students were interviewed, evaluated, and decided by the sponsors and four other students. Peer Helpers is a group of students who are trained to listen to other students' needs. Every week the group met to discuss upcoming events or to listen to a guest speaker. Many volunteers came to discuss alcohol and drug abuse, sexuality, and teach listening awareness skills. Many members of the group volunteered their time for tutoring purposes.

On December 22, 1992, Peer Helpers presented a program called "Celebrate Life," a series of stories and events presented by the members to help students and faculty members realize that life should not be taken for granted.

To become aware of the duties of the Peer Helpers, the Elwood Peer Helpers attended a retreat at Indiana University's Bradford Woods. Every member was able to attend the retreat. Elwood Peer Helpers were joined together with Frankton and Lapel Peer Helpers to form smaller groups of eight. Each group was taught how to communicate with each other, how to listen attentively, how to trust each other, and how to understand what people are trying to say.

The group plans to increase its number, form a Peer Helper group at the middle school, perform "Celebrating Life" at other schools, and become more active with the student body.









Piece of the Community
