


WHAT IS FRANKTON HIGH?

The lines and circles may have looked like chicken tracks to some, but not to the girls in the shorthand class. A new Gregg method, Diamond Jubilee, was introduced.



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




From x+y to Einstein's theory of relativity, scientists and mathmaticians advanced up the ladder to success this year.

Following the banquet, entertainment by the Impacts, imitating the Beatles, started the evening. Rex Jenkins and his orchestra furnished music by which the couples danced.






IT IS ORGANIZATIONS

All work and no play, would make F. H. S. a dull place indeed.






The sound of music and marching feet is the F.H.S. band as they march in parades here and around the county. The band played at the home ballgames and at other special events.


SOCIETY AND STUDENT COUNCIL


MATH CLUB EXPANDS CO-CURRICULAR PROGRAM






