## Vocational School

Many of the high school students attend vocational school. Vocational school is provided to show students what it is like to work at a profession that they might be considering as their career. Vocational school is usually only eligible to juniors and seniors.

Students can attend vocational school have two major choices: attend at Anderson at Ebbert or Elwood at John C. Hinds and attend in the AM or PM hours. The majority of the students attend during PM hours. Students go to half a day of classes at school, then go to classes at the vocational school.

In vocational school the students are provided with a variety of different vocational school choices. There is law enforcement, health professionals, business technology, building trades, cosmetology, auto mechanics, auto technology, and print technology.

Students have to have a least four math classes throughout high school. Some students are able to get out of math their senior year if they choose the option of doubling up on math either their freshman or sophomore year. This gives seniors a chance to relax just a little bit more in their last year of school.

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H eighth grade teacher. Along with learning basic English principles, students also read several books in class, watch movies, and are required to read a book per each six weeks, and take an RC test on each one.

When students reach eighth grade, they do basically the same as when they were in seventh, except that the grammar, sentence structure, and books they read are more difficult. Students really get into the parts of speech and do whole lessons on each one. They also learn the proper way to write paragraphs, and how to put essays together. The books that eighth graders read in class are more difficult, and they have more class discussions, and quizzes over chapters. The discussions in class help the students get a better understanding of the books, and it helps them to retain information better. By the time they finish the year, eighth graders should be very well-prepared, and feel comfortable of going into freshman English the following year.
