
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


## Drugs don't make it


end up with a good record at the end of the season. After the Homecoming game, the team left the field with a 7 - 0 record.


# Making The Moves





Brian Culp, Eagle's Wings editor-in-chief, decided what news was worthy to be printed.









This year turned out to be an eventful one for the Honor Society. They were involved in initiations, a dinner, coat checks, and a program called Quarters for Kids.





> The Health Club took part in two blood drives, a canned food drive, went Christmas caroling, baked cookies for the visiting nurses, and took part in the Special Olympics.







> With the Technical Preparation program going into effect next year, the Industrial Technology program will become even bigger and even more computerized.








### Keeping the Pace



MVP awards were given out for both teams. For the boys, Brandon Sanders received the award. Christen O'Neil received the MVP for the girls team.







When sectional came around, the Eagles were ranked #3 in class 2A. After thumping Winchester, the Eagles were upset in the 2nd round for the first time in 5 years.


Despite the loss, senior









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

Hart was most valuable sprinter, Lesley Benefiel was most valuable distance, and Aynes was most valuable field events and most valuable overall.















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
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
