Besides learning the everyday schoolwork, students need to learn how to work with others in a social environment. These skills will follow students for the rest of their adult lives










A friend is defined in <u>Webster's Dictionary</u> as a person attached to another by affection or regard. This can be a person that you hang around with or someone you just simply talk to.






Style can be anything from what your wear to how you present yourself.


You can acquire a "preppylook" by wearing neat clothes with dockers and sweaters.











The Sapphire Silhouttes had better luck though. They were able to travel all the way to Nashville, Tennessee and were able to give an outstanding performance.






The magical night continued as students were









Brian Ice, the 4th ranked senior, closed out the evening with his comments.


As the seniors filed out of the gym two by two one might stop and realize that although these students are saying goodbye to old memories and old friends a new beginning is awaiting them.






Seventh grade, coming to a bigger school, making new friends, being in the same building as the high school. Sounds pretty exciting.







He was a student teacher at Frankton four years ago before moving on.


Morehead taught two years at LaCross. He says it is great to be here and he is happy to be a regular teacher.



Journalism is a class to prepare students for mass media. There are many more deadlines to meet and many more responsibilities to fulfill. Journalism is the first step.







Foreign Language


A foreign language is one of the most difficult classes to comprehend for a Freshman. But for some reason, there are signing up for a foreign language. What could be the reason?









The music history and music theory class covered various areas of study this year. With only eight people in the class the atmosphere was very relaxed and family-like.


This class, in the past has only been offered every couple of years, this year being the first in two.

In the Mass Media class there is a lot of talent displayed. The students have certain jobs, from photographers and writers to editor of the yearbook or newspaper.


In most cases students in this class were in the journalism class the previous year, so that they would know the skills needed to produce a newspaper or yearbook.

Journalism


In journalism, the students learned many new skills. Whether they were writing beats, a story in the newspaper, or setting up their computers, they were always busy and learning at the same time.



Student Council


At the beginning of the year student council was busy preparing for Homecoming activities. They had dress-up days the following week and homecoming games were that Friday during school and the game was that night.








H. S. Marching Band


Jr. High Band


Winter Guard




Officers for FHA changed every 6 weeks so everyone could have a chance at being an officer. There were elections in 2 class periods.

FHA joined up with the Health Club for its annual Christmas Caroling. They went to Dickey's nursing home in Elwood.



Hard work, running as a team , and having fun; What do these words mean? They mean a lot if you are on the cross-country team. These are just a few things that are needed to have a good season.



Coach for the girls team Mrs. Seager felt that Wendy ran well each race and was consistent throughout the season, for a first year runner.














B oys Tennis Take Sectiona Finish season 14-7







E agles start season big, but lose in sectiona


This year, the Basketball team made it over a lot of obstacles. One of the biggest was filling a lot of empty positions. But the team did this without any problem.


Jason Hobbs dishes a pass for a spot up three pointer. Hobbs was the point guard and court leader.







"We are only going to lose one player off this year's team which will really help them for a good season and a possible sectional championship." Stacie alson added.










Senior, Carole Robinette answered with a similar response in that she thought she set a good example because of her experience, and the team let her know what is expected of her as a senior.







The season was not even close to ending for both teams though, they still had three large tournaments to compete in.



Following Gassner on the team depth chart was Justin Weber. In this his third year, Weber received the Most Improved Player award and will be returning for his fourth and final season next year.





Frankton ended their season with four wins and seven losses. The team hoped to fare a little better with five returning





This season they had 5 runners, 3 more than they had last season. The girls team struggled and finished 2-7 on the season.





Finally they pulled together to get their first and only win of the season against Tri-Central 6-0.







The boys hoped to finish first in the county meet but could only get a score of 44, which was good enough for fourth place.




I noticed that something is much different than ever before. Maybe it is knowing that this was my last chance to perform at state finals or maybe it was the


After Chris had placed the


