The Natural Way is the Frankton Way! Not so much the wheat germ and sunflower seeds; but the way we do things: Naturally.


The Natural Way at Frankton is taking time out to be wild and crazy like Scott Carpenter did one day in Speech and Drama class.


The unity between players on a team is a natural feeling here. The unity was there when we beat unbeaten Triton Central and also when the Cross Country team won the Sheridan Invitational.


A natural happening every year is picture day. This day comes and goes just as Awards Day and semester test days do. Some are just dreaded, others are just nerve racking.






There is not definite placement service in either school. Some students go on to further their education. Some students are placed in jobs by their instructor.

Vocational School is a chance to learn a trade that you can use forever.











Frankton has two major banquets in the year, one is for fall sports and the other for winter and spring sports. There is also another banquet that is put on for all of Frankton's athletes by the


Methodist Church.

Finally. The Frankton Eagles football team finally broke a 17-game losing streak which was compiled over the previous two seasons.

Before the year began, head coach Bob Scharnowske predicted that his team would have a 7-3 season, and due to the hard work of the players and coaches, this prediction came true.

One of the highlights of the year came in the final game, which was against a southern Indiana power, the Triton Central Tigers. The Tigers were boasting of their 9-0 record, that is, boasting until they met the Frankton Eagles. The Eagles sent the Tigers back with their first and only defeat of the year hanging heavily over their heads. The Tigers' perfect season was lost in a game where the Eagles' will and want to win pulled them ahead 33-20. The 1979 football team had some terrific accomplishments—They not only ended 7-3, but won their final four games in a row, outscoring their opponents by an average of 26-9 in these last



games—They won the WRC for the first time in the history of football at FHS—And, believe it or not, were awarded Honorable Mention in the Final Class A poll.





For the second year in a row, the Frankton cross-country team has had a winning season. Their record for dual and three-way meets was 11-1, their only loss coming at the hands of Mt. Vernon.

The team did very well in large meets, with the highlight of the season being the Eagles' victory at the 9-team Sheridan Invitational. Frankton's Marty Hughes took second place overall to lead the Eagle runners to this win.

Earlier in the season, at the Pike Hokum-Karum meet, our Eagles placed 10th out of 19.

In the Conference, the team fell just 8 points shy of Shenandoah, and settled for second. At the Sectional meet, the Eagles defeated half of the starting field,

and placed 6th out of 13, missing a bid for the Regional by just one place.






Wrestlers finish 6-5


Rick Hiatt tries desperately to get a pin.

Pride was important as they watched each other grow in strength and unity. No personal achievement went by without praise.










Girls finish 4-11


The girls had a pretty good start in the sectional. This gives us the idea that the team is building and could have a much better season next year.







Golf Ends Season

















Frankton attended all but forestry.


Besides the poultry team composed of: Mike Mays, Kevin Antrim, Lee Hendricks, and David Hicks, they had a livestock team qualify for the district.

The mother-daughter banquet took place in April. This was also to honor the seniors.











This year the Frankton High School's pep club wasn't as large as it had been in the past, but the girls in the pep club went all out when it came to spirit.


There was even quite a few boys who sat with the pep club and yelled as loud or louder than the girls.


For the first year, the band, along with Jazz Band, put on a concert for the public.






















Gay Forrester named
