


VICTORY!









137 people died in a Delta Airlines crash near Dallas. Only 31 people survived the crash.









Students against driving drunk are S.A.D.D.










The Media Club members work hard to keep our library as clean and neat as possible.


The two vocational schools are located in Anderson and Elwood.

The band placed seventh in class D at the Hoosier Dome. This was a first experience for junior, Kelinda Eden. She com-


































