## Homecoming games

In the presence of many past players. Coach Cress brought back what worked many times before, smash mouth football. The Eagles pounded 331 yards on the ground to lead the way to a 53-6 homecoming victory over the Wes-Del Warriors.

The Eagle offense was clicking on all cylinders Friday night. The Eagles racked up 519 total yards. Leading the charger was a duo of multi talented running backs. Junior running back Pete Hobbs netted 220 yards total offense, 108 were rushing yards, and 112 were receiving. Hobb's backfield partner, Pete Graham, also was a major contributer with 114 rushing yards on only 9 carries.

The passing offense was also in top form. Junior quarterback NateCress completed a season best 9 of 13 for 178 yards and 2 touchdowns.

The defense had a duty of taking care of wishbone offense. The Warriors ran the option a lot, but the Eagles stepped up and shut them down. They forced five Warrior fumbles and recovered two of them and had one interception. The Eagles held the Warriors to only 210 total yards.

The victory brought the Eagles' record to $4-4$ with one game left.

$F$acs stands for Family and Consumers Sciences Education. The unique focus is on families, work, and their interrelationships. Mrs. Whitsel teaches FACS. FACS consists of these classes: Nutrition and Food(NF), Interpersonal Relations(IPR), 7TH and 8TH grade FACS, Introduction to the World of Work(IWOW), Independent Living(IL), and Human Development(HD). NF consists of some basic nutrition information plus food service and lab skills. IPR consists of skills that help you get along with others, manners, communication, conflict resolution, and other information to help avoid destructive behaviors. IWOW helps students learn the basic information about work. HD helps students understand families, communication, decision making, conflict resolution, Love vs. Infatuation, engagements, marriage, and parenting. The students take the Baby Think It Over home. They also get to use the Empathy Belly. It lets the students know how a pregnant woman feels. The 7th graders cover interpersonal skills. They also learn the 3R's: Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle. The final portion of the semester is working in the kitchen. The 8th graders start with child development and progress of child care. The second thing they cover is Consumers Economics.

Then the students learn about sewing and the study of clothing care and stain removal. According to Mrs. Whitsel," Some students are interested and some aren't." The FACS department helps prepare students for family and work life.

Frankton has five Math teachers: Mr. Householder, Mr. Abernathy, Mr. Bauchert, Mrs. Miller, and Mr. Fry. Mrs. Miller teaches careers, Math 8, and Pre-Algebra 8. Careers is a class where the students explore their own personal interests and and talents. Math 8 consists of basic skills, dealing with whole numbers, decimals, fractions, integers, algebraic equations, and percentages. Pre-Algebra 8 is to get students ready to take Algebra when they are in high school. Mr. Fry teaches Math 7. Mr. Bauchert teaches high school Pre-Algebra, Intro Algebra I and Intro Algebra II. Mr. Abernathy teaches Pre-Algebra, Algebra I, and Algebra II. Pre-Algebra teaches probality, predictions, counting, and arrangements. Algebra I teaches rational expressions and Algebra

II teaches radicals. Mr. Householder teaches calculus, advanced math, and geometry. When asked if the students seem interested, Mr. Householder replied, "In recent years I have had fewer and fewer students who really are interested in what I'm teaching. Unfortunately, that takes a difficult subject and makes it impossible because the effort required for success is more than the students interest level will allow. However , there are always some who want to learn, and I feed off their enthusiasm.


$T$he Business teachers this year include Mr. Morehead, Mrs. Davis and Mrs. Cook. Mr. Morehead teaches Computer Accounting and Keyboarding. It depends on whether or not the students pick up on the material if they like the class. Mr. Morehead said, "My favorite class to teach is Computer Accounting. Mrs. Davis teaches Introduction to Business, Word Processing and Computer Applications. She is also in charge of the School-to-Work program that replaced the previous Tech Prep program. This allows students to go straight out of high school to a job. Word Processing is a class where the students create programs, newsletters, etc. "My favorite class to teach is Word Processing." stated Mrs. Davis. The applied physics class participated in an egg drop, constructed a tennis ball catapult, and built a bridge to support two pounds. Mr. Flewelling said, "I enjoy working at FJSHS. The students are good and I like the challenge of getting them interested in science.

Material Processing is part of manufacturing. They study different materials and how manufacturing works. The class is more interested in the new product ideas rather than the finished product. Design Process is an advanced drafting class where the students use Computer Aided Drafting and explore Architecture, Design, and Advanced Mechanical Drafting. Communication Systems is a beginner's drafting course. The students learn the different types of mechanical drawing skills, measuring, lay-out, sketching, and some design work. The Junior High tech classes explore the world of Industrial Technology. They deal with construction, transportation, communication, energy, and manufacturing.


Woods, Metals, Material Processing, Design Process, Communication Systems, and the Junior High Tech class are the classes in Tech Systems.

Economics consists of how to manage money and is business related. The students in Economics were required to complete a series projects in order to graduate. Government was taught by Mrs. Folsom this year for the first time in awhile. This class teaches the students about government branches and the judicial system of the United States. Geography is taught by Mr. LeMaster and is a class that involves land regions and different countries. U.S. History teaches the students about our nation's history. Land measurement, soil tillage and conservation, and diseases and pests of plants are just a few things that students who take Plant and Soil Science learn about. Animal Science classes addresses topics such as genetics, reproduction, and nutrition. In the supervised agricultural experience class, students apply what they learn in class to real-life situations.

$T$here are several health classes offered at Frankton Jr. Sr. High School. These classes include: Health 10, Body Maintenance, Safety, and Health II. All sophomores are required to pass one semester of health. In this class students began by studying the circulatory and respiratory systems. This prepared the students for their unit on CPR. Sophomores who passed the CPR course were certified by the American Red Cross. They also studied human reproduction and self esteem. Safety is a one semester class offered to sophomores, juniors, and seniors. In this class students learn how to care for the human body using basic first aid. They learned everything from CPR to treating insect bites. In Body Maintenance students spent half of the class in the class room and the other half participating in aerobic activities. In the class room they learned how to live healthy lifestyle. Health II or Anatomy is a class offered to jnior and seniors. In this class students studied cells, body systems, and skeletal and muscular systems. They also learned about injuries and sports related injuries. On the junior high level, Mrs. Seager taught both the seventh and eighth graders. They studied many of the same things such as: physical health, mental health, social health, communicable and noncommunicable diseases, and first aid. Students also spent time studying drugs and alcohol.
