## Are You Ready?



Most students in their Junior and Senior years begin taking classes that are here to benefit those people trying to get prepared for their four year commitment. Above state requirements the classes recommended for college-bound students are: Four years of English, Algebra Geometry, two years of Foreign language, and Chemistry if you're
 planning a nursing or health career.

If you choose the business course there is typing $1 \& 2$, Shorthand, General Business, and Accounting. Or you could choose classes in the area of Agriculture, Home Economics, Journalism, or Graphic Arts but these areas as many classes as in business or college levels. Also, in the History department, aside from Civics and World History, there are no advanced classes to take.




## You Going?

There are a variety of colleges to choose from. You may want to go to a four year college, junior college, or technical college. Consider these things when choosing: 1-Where the college is located-Will you want to be close to home so you can visit often or far away in another state? 2-Housing-Do you want to live at home or live in a dorm or apartment on campus? 3-Cost-Some people may think getting enough money is impossible, but there are ways to do it. You can apply for scholarships available or you may receive government grants. 4-Course of Interest-Do the schools you are considering specialize in the field that you wish to major in? Are there sufficient classes? 5-Sports-If you're planning sports, do you know what their program is for that sport? 6-Size of School-Do you wish to go to a large or small school?

Although these are very important things to consider, many students choose a college for reasons other than these. One, for example, is going to a certain college because a friend or your parents or grandparents went there.

In looking for a college or institution, the first step is self knowledge of one's strengths and weaknesses. Also, the tests, you take don't indicate ability but are more of a guide to the level of college or university you should investigate. One way to tell of the existence of a good department is if it has a high \% of full-time faculty. Part-time instructors may be excellent, but they play no part in the on-going work of the department.
In the best schools, faculty handle student advising. They are a part of the student's life at that time and realize what is going on. Other non-faculty counselors may sometimes be misguiding.
When you finally think about choosing a college, do an in-depth visit. Every college puts on a show to make their school look best. Be sure not to believe everything you read in pamphlets or books. Find out things from first hand experience or by talking to some people who have been to that college. Also, realize that every school has its bad departments. Just be sure that the college you wish to attend doesn't have a poor department in your subject. But the most important thing of all to remember is, Go to the college YOU wish to attend, not the one others want you do.

## Students can prepare for career here at Frankton

There are certain state requirements that a person must meet in the state of Indiana in order to go to college.

There are also classes that someone could take to get into a field that does not require a college degree. Some that are offered at Frankton High School include; Business, Agriculture, Industrial Arts, and Art classes.

Teachers can prepare students to begin their careers as soon as they graduate from high school. For instance, Industrial Arts, students during their 4 years of high school, would take all the necessary drawing and printing classes to get into the printing field although it is very hard to enter this field. (In Architecture, however you must go to a college, or a similar school for 5 years to become an architect.)

Students who would be interested in the Business field would take all business class available here at Frankton to qualify for a business oriented job. These classes include Bookkeeping, Typing, Shorthand, and General Business. Although it is not necessary, it would be to a student's benefit to go to a business college if they were pursuing a


business career such as Accounting.
In the field of Agriculture you can further your knowledge of farming and farm related subjects in college, but it is not a "must". Many students from Frankton can go right on to farming after high school, or if they choose to do so, go to a vocational school.

There are classes that students take as hobbies, just for fun, or simply to get credits. Some of these are Industrial Arts, Art, and Home Economics. You can learn a lot if you really want to, all you have to do is put your mind to it.

The art department here at Frankton consists of five different classes. A freshman general art class, two dimensional design, three dimensional design, and two craft classes.

Anyone who is interested in art usually begins by enrolling in the freshman general art class the freshman year. The class spends time on as many areas as possible including drawing, painting, macrame, pottery, weaving, and cartooning.

The two dimensional design class focuses on painting and drawing. In this class the basic skills in drawing are continued from the general art class and the student begins to learn painting techniques.

The three dimensional design class focuses on projects with width and depth rather than flat pieces of paper.

Projects included in the course are paper relief sculptures, mobiles, and wire sculptures.

The two craft classes are electives open to juniors and seniors. Included in the year's activities are weaving, macrame, batik, creative stitchery, rug making, ceramics, and metal enameling.

One area not mentioned in the art department very often is the concept of independent study. This is a separate class designed for the student who is serious about art, but cannot fit any of the classes into his schedule.

Independent study may be taken during any of the regular art classes throughout the school day.
