ACADEMICS -the key to a better future. For us it unlocks many things: the opportunity to choose our occupation, the groundwork for our future work. The wide variety of courses offered at Frankton High enables each of us to gain knowledge along the lines of our interest so that we will be happy in our work.

Many classes are offered to teach the student a vocation. Shop classes offer a wide variety to choose from. Mr. Johnson gives the boys a sample of working with metal, wood working, electricity, and simple mechanics. A well equipped shop furnishes the needed facilities.

Typing classes teach girls and boys alike a useful skill.

Future farmers in the agriculture classes get practical training in their chosen vocation. They often make field trips to get actual experience in judging soil and livestock.

The varied vocational classes give the student an idea of what a particular line of work is like and attempts to give him some experience.

Health classes give the Freshman and Sophomore students a knowledge of how their function and the proper methods of hygiene. To help demonstrate this, the department has a "take-apart" scale model of the human body with all of the major organs removable. Physical education is taught every other three weeks. These classes take advantage of the outdoor basketball and tennis courts, the track, and softball diamonds so long as weather permits. During the long winter months, the gymnasium is put to full use.

Mrs. Sue Hover is responsible for the activities of the girls while Mr. Ted Harbit is in charge of the boys.

## Health and P.E. Classes

The cry of the Nation is that we might be physically fit to protect our country. The program set into motion by the late President Kennedy is in operation in the Frankton Schools. Mr. Ted Harbit, himself an athlete, is a firm believer that to be mentally alert a young man must be physically alert, and a variety of activities are arranged that the young men in the phy ed classes may develop physically.

Modern math taught in the modern manner is a challenge to algebra students taught by Mr. William Brown.


Five years of math may be taken by students in Frankton High School. Two years of algebra with its equations and formulas are offered the students. Plane and solid geometry and analytic geometry challenge many who are further interested, and those who have special interests or math ambitions venture into trig and calculus. General math is offered as an alternate course to ninth grade.

One year of chemistry offered to juniors and seniors introduces students to a possible career in the engineering field. Practically every science course offered in high school or college will require some knowledge of chemistry.

## Languages Open Up A New World

Every student in Frankton High School is made aware of his opportunities in a free country. To enjoy these opportunities to the fullest, students must learn to express themselves well.

Four years of English, beginning with grade nine, include courses in grammar, American and general literature, and written and oral composition, are offered to F.H.S. students.

Practical experience in oral work is offered to students participation in the Drama Club with the presentation of plays during the school year, and in written composition through demonstration of journalistic efforts by writing news for the local papers.
