






Our mascot, the Eagle, was spruced up earlier this year and re-presented to the school and now is in one of the display cases in the main hall outside the gymnasiums. K.G.



The Thespians spent four days and five nights in the heart of New York's theater district.


The total cost of the trip was \$700 not including spending money. The whole trip was loaded full of activity. One of the best loved plays was "Phantom of the Opera".



The T.V. sitcom that was recommended by Seniors was The Fresh Prince of Bel Air. But they suggested to stay away from Beverly Hills 90210.







The 1990-91 Sports Year-in-Review

The 1990-91 Eagle sports year was one to be remembered for years to come. Starting with fall sports, the football team was undefeated at 8-0, and was the 1990 WRAC and Sectional champion. In the last two years the football team has won 22 games and lost only two, the first being to Tri-West, a state runner up, and the second to Indianapolis Scecina, the state champion. Meanwhile the Cross Country team was having another good season and their record was 7-1 with a 3rd place in WRAC and a sectional placing of 4th. The whole team qualified for regional for the 2nd consecutive year. The girl's team qualified for regional for the first time ever. Another first for FJSHS in 1990 was the emergence of a boys tennis team. They had a record of 4 and 7 which is excellent for a team in its rookie season. The volleyball team had another eventful season with new head coach Dave Pilkington. They enjoyed an 18 and 10 record, winning both the Mt. Vernon and the Shenandoah invitational tournaments. The girls made a strong show in sectional, but were eliminated in the semifinals of the tournament

Winter sports picked up the winning tradition right where the fall sports left off with expectations for every sport. The basketball team had one of the most memorable seasons ever. Not only did they have a remarkable season, with a 17 and 6 record, they made it to the finals of the Anderson sectional for the first time since 1957. That is one to be placed in the scrap books for every student that witnessed. Also they bore the WRAC traveling bucket for a number of weeks before having it taken away in a close over-time game with Pendleton. The wrestling team did remarkably well considering they had 6 freshmen on the varsity squad and only one senior. They had an 8-8 dualmatch record and placed 2nd in the sectional. They were 6th in the County, 5th in the WRAC; and placed 8th in the East Central Indiana Classic. Girls Basketball also put together a fine year with 11 wins with 8 losses. If it weren't for a surprise upset in the first round of sectional they might have at least gotten 2nd.

In the midst of the winter sports glory the spring sports were in training to keep the winning tradition alive for the rest of the school year. The track team showed that they were for real by placing second in the WRAC conference meet, and 3rd in the Pendleton Invitational. They finished 12-0 and completed their third consecutive undefeated season. The girls placed 2nd at the WRAC conference tournament also, and have a 9 and 2 record. The softball team finished 7-10 after a disappointing season. The girls were defeated by Elwood in the first game of the sectional. The Baseball team played well with a winning record of 22 and 7. The team returned a lot of lettermen and is expected to have a great season. They advanced to the second game in the sectional where they were defeated 3-2 by Madison Heights' star pitcher. The golf team showed great improvment from last year. The team finished 6-6 and finished 6th in the WRAC. Coach Huntsinger put together the best golf team in a long time at FJSHS. Another new edition to FJSHS was a girls tennis team. Even though they ended up with a losing record they showed great promise and have a lot to look for next year.

As far as "wrap-up" goes, the 1990-91 Eagle sports year was excellent. We have combined for a total of 117 wins and only 58 losses. The Eagle sports fans can only hope that the next sports year will be as productive as this one was.









It was March 2, 1991 at the Wigwam with the Frankton Eagles facing off with the Highland Scots






















Young Wrestlers have impressive 8-8 Season







Baseball Ends Great Season in Close Sectional



Next year the Lady Eagles will be returning ten lettermen. Let's hope that with the talent and experience the team has, that the girls can turn it around.

























The band also had other obligations such as the musical and variety show to prepare for after marching season ended. Their very last performance of the year was Graduation.









On January 22, twenty student council members acted as tour guides for the eighth graders and their parents at the freshmen orientation.








Pins and Wins for Jr. High Wrestlers



8th Grade 1st County Champs; 7th Grade Coming On Strong









This year the Jr. High Choir was so big that it was divided into two class periods. Mrs. Burgess taught second hour while Mr. Cecil taught sixth hour.


The choir had two performances. The first was the Christmas concert and their last performance was the Variety Show where their surfing and dancing numbers were a big hit.





At age 43, Nola nRyan still throws as hard as players half his age. He holds more than 40 major league records including an unprecedented 7 no-hitters.



The entrance to the school was decorated with blue streamers and a border resembling small castles. While some people were dancing the night away, others were waiting for their pictures to be taken in front


of the castle gateway decorated with tinsel, balloons, and a blue background.


JA ROCK AND ROLL OLDIES SHOW J





I hope you all enjoyed the 1990-'91 yearbook.






