## ACTIVITIES FOR FHS STUDENTS

With emphasis placed on the physical fitness program, FHS students participated in more physical activities in their education classes. Both the boys and girls used the outdoor basketball and tennis courts north of the school. Bright, and early our energetic athletes were out running their daily mile or were having batting practice before the big game. When the weather turned cold, the gymnasium was used for volleyball and tumbling. The girls formed a bowling league this year, and they held scoot soccer tournaments. The physical education classes were taught every three weeks with the remaining of the grading period spent in health class. With the aid of the "take-apart" model of the human body, the students understood more clearly the complexities of the body.

## VOCATIONAL COURSES

The vocational courses were an important part of the Frankton High School curriculum. The homemaking classes gave the girls practical knowledge on practical homemaking skills, such as cooking, sewing, first aid, and nursing. More advanced classes specialized in child development and child care. The shop classes began electrical training with the arrival of new electronics equipment. The shop classes also included woodworking, metal, and simple mechanics. The agriculture classes consisted of judging and the learning of modern farm techniques. Students in mechanical drawing classes learned basic views of drawings. Later in the year, they learned shop techniques to be used the following year.

## ART THEORY EXPANDS KNOWLEDGE

Starting as early as seven in the morning till two in the afternoon, students in the 8 weeks' drivers' education classes received instruction and the experience needed for proper driving habits. B\&M Motors in Elwood furnished the dual control cars, and several faculty members conducted the classroom instruction and "in the car supervision."

For the first time at FHS, a music theory course was offered to the students in addition to the summer band program conducted by Mr. Barker.

With 120 students enrolled in art, fine pieces of work were completed this year. In the fall students did outdoor sketching and still life studies. Figure drawing was also popular, along with art appreciation and the study of famous artists.

# FHS SCIENCE AND MATH STUDENTS

Our future scientists and mathematicians prepared for their inherited scientific world this year. Freshman had a choice of general math or Algebra I, while sophomores struggled with geometry. Algebra II students were faced with the "new math" simplification methods. Those seniors with special interests in math advanced into trigonometry and calculus. With the adoption of new science books, chemistry, biology, and physics students ventured into a more detailed study of our scientific world. Chemistry turned out to be quite an expensive course for students with excessive equipment breakage and acid-eaten clothes. Lab sessions were more frequent for biology students where they were busy observing cells, and dissecting frogs, fish, and worms. Even though biology was required for sophomores, a group of Freshman on the college prep course took the biology instruction.

## ADDITIONAL FOREIGN

FHA English classes were centered around composition and Modern and English Literature. Literature offered us an insight into our own problems. Reading good books gave us a better understanding of those around us. Classes were made more interesting by debates on questions aroused by Shakespeare, George Eliot, and Hawthorne. Grades nine and ten specialized in short themes and essays; while juniors and seniors struggled through research and the compiling of notes for their term papers. All the classes conducted public speaking that built up confidence in the students. Seniors had the privilege of announcing school news over the WBMP-FM radio station.


## LANGUAGE BROADENS LINGUISTIC

With the addition of German to our foreign language curriculum, FHS students had access to three foreign tongues. Latin I and II have been traditional at Frankton. Latin I students concentrated on the rules of declining Latin words and stressed the importance of the Latin-English derivatives; while Latin II students relived the Gallic Wars of Caesar through translations. Spanish has been at FHS for four years. Having obtained the basic principles of the language, the students conversed with each other with the aid of records and tapes. Students who visited Mexico last summer, shared their personal recollections of the Spanish people with their classmates. Instruction in German offered those students who had completed another language a new and challenging experience.

## IN FHS SOCIAL SCIENCE CLASSES

Required for all juniors, U.S. History presented a knowledge of America's past and activated a lively interest in her future. For those who wished to sharpen up on the biographies of our nation's forefathers or America's part in the World Wars, extensive reading materials were available in the school library or instructor Lida Barker's personal book collection. Normal class routines were enlivened with historical skits, taped Supreme Court decisions, and turn-about days when a student became the teacher. Civics and economics, which the seniors studied one semester each, concentrated on the structure of both the national and state governments with emphasis placed on the economic system of the United States. Using TIME magazine as a supplementary text, sociology students were deeply aware of the national and international events.
