



A true friend knows you, accepts you for who you are and believes in you.






Students enjoy Post Prom

supper.










The third ranked senior, Brandy Hobbs gave the opening remarks. The choir then followed with the song, "This Is The Place."








The prince and princess were Joey Mahoney and Chelsea Masterson. Sophomore Erin Hendricks said































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
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
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












The End Of Our World
